OUR WOUNDED.

As to the wounded Canadians at the last engagement at Paardeberg, only the surnames were at first sent by telegraph. These were manifestly worthless, because there are many in the regiment who bear the names of most of these reported to have been wounded, and there was no means of identification. We telegraphed specially for information upon this point but have not yet been able to obtain it. Indeed, the official list has not yet, so far as we can learn, been published in Canada. Lieutenant Colonel Moore, however, received a despatch yesterday, to say that John Archibald Harris, son of Mr. John Harris, is the "Harris" reported wounded at Paardeberg, and that Mr. Nelson Brace, son of Mr. R. K. Brace, of this city, is also reported wounded. The St. John Telegraph has the New Brunswick wounded as follows:

F. W. Sprague, St. John; Corporal F. W. Coombs, St. John; H. E. Durant Moncton; H. Leavitt, Grand Lake; Ambrose Pelkey, St. John.

Nothing has been reported concerning the severity of the wounds.

THE BRIDGE.

THE PATRIOT has failed to explain the radical difference of the positions occupied by Premier Farquharson and Attorney General McKinnon concerning the location of the Hillsborough Bridge and the consequence of a little delay in order that the desires of the people may be consulted. Nor has it published the draft agreement, which is said to be "such a good thing for the Province." The people are therefore left to draw their own conclusions. One of these is that the Attorney General and the Hon. Benjamin Rogers have some personal interest to serve in their desire to have the bridge placed out of the way of ordinary traffic. The Attorney General is silent upon the point; but Mr. Rogers has written the following letter to the Patriot:

SIR,—It is reported that I am actuated by other motives than those in the best interests of the city, in the position I have taken with respect to the site of the Hillsborough Bridge. I repudiate all such reports, and beg to state that I am neither directly nor indirectly interested in any property at Kensington Point or in the vicinity thereof. In advocating this location, I am guided solely by the Engineer's report which states that the Cumberland site is not practicable. It is un-

necessary to add that I am also influenced in this matter, by the interests of the city and a strong desire to see the bridge built promptly and its construction not needlessly delayed or perhaps jeopardized. Yours, etc.,

Accepting Mr. Rogers' denial, we are thrown back upon Mr. Rogers' reasons. Does the Engineer's report contain a statement that the Cumberland street site "is not practicable?" If so, we have failed to see it. The Engineer indicates several points at which, in his opinion, the Cumberland street site would be at a disadvantage. But he nowhere says it is impracticable, and he states clearly that the difference in cost would be \$88,360.99 thereby intimating that it is practicable.

We shall not now—in the absence of the memoranda to be laid before the Board of Trade—discuss the matter. Upon reflection we are convinced that Premier Farquharson is—whatever his motives may be—acting in the interests of the public, and is not jeopardizing the building of the bridge when he asks for delay and consideration before consummating the secret agreement.

It is pleasing to note that the Government have, in their estimates, provided for the construction of the work within the next fiscal year; and, we sincerely hope that the best site for the bridge may be fixed upon independently of every consideration except that of the public interest.

By the way, perhaps the Attorney-General will say what became of the petition in favor of the Cumberland Street site? Was it submitted to the authorities at Ottawa? Was it supported by the advocacy of the delegates?

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Some of the Paris newspapers urge Great Britain to accept mediation now that she has secured an important victory. Mediation might perhaps be considered inconsistent with "unconditional surrender."

—It is hoped that the Frenchman who boasted that he designed the intrenchments on the Tugela and defeated Buller will not escape capture by the British. He would look well in company with the German specialists.

—It has been remarked that Hugh John Macdonald's Premiership of Manitoba is giving politics in that province a healthier tone. There are no more "deals." Sifticism no longer rules, and the people are already experiencing a season of honest government.

—Sir Louis H. Davies thinks that in sending matter through the mails without paying postage thereon a minister's good taste is the only effective check; and the Montreal Gazette remarks that "Sir Richard Cartwright, who so sent some tons of his own speech to frequently unwilling recipients, must have a shocking bad taste."

—At the address given at the Government House, Calcutta, on the evening of the 28th of February Lord Curzon gave the following toast: "I propose, on this great occasion, to break the ordinary rule. I ask you to drink the health of that brave soldier and former Indian commander-in-chief, who on the anniversary of Majuba, has wiped out the stain and gained a noble, yes, a glorious victory."

—The Queen interpreted the feelings of the British people, as well as her own, when she telegraphed to General Buller:

"I have heard with the deepest concern of the heavy losses sustained by my brave Irish soldiers, and I desire to express my sympathy and admiration of the splendid fighting qualities they have exhibited throughout these trying operations."

Irish soldiers won the honors in the relief of Ladysmith as the Canadians did at the last attack upon Paardeberg.
