

Bobby Dowling Winner Of Pro Title

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—John Steele of Riverside Golf and Country Club walked away with the New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island golfing crown Wednesday with a record breaking 291 on 72 holes.

1954 champion carded a 76, 72, 75 and 68 in three day's play to top the old mark of 292 set by M. J. (Mousie) Dowling of Moncton in last year's tournament.

Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown also broke a record when he copped a 285 to win the professional and open title. Dowling fired a 73, 71, 69 and 72 to beat the 1955 mark set by John Smith of Truro, N.S. by six strokes.

Sixteen-year-old Bill Hutchinson of Riverside won the junior title with a 304. He improved Wednesday with rounds of 73 and 74 after the only champion to retain his title was G. J. (Pete) Campbell of St. Croix who won the senior title with 298 and tied Doug Lewis of Moncton for runner-up position in the amateur division.

B. J. Davidson of Riverside placed third in the amateur class with 299 and Eugene Mealey of Westfield was next with 300.

Members of the 1956 Willingdon Cup team are Steele, Lewis, Campbell and Mealey. Bill Davidson will be unable to make the Edmondston, N.B., trip next month so Mealey will go in his place.

Hutchinson will also make the trip to play in the Canadian junior championships.

 TORONTO (CP)—Archie Moore the reigning self-styled world heavyweight champion, cut down James J. Parker Wednesday night to win by a technical knockout in a fight that ended in a bloody mess at 2:02 of the ninth round.

Referee Billy Burke stepped between the two with Parker, 26, onto, almost out on his feet. Blood was gushing from his nose and a cut over his left eye-lid. Blood blotted both fighters.

Dr. Thomas E. Flommerfelt, ring physician, examined Parker's eye after the main event when lights of the stadium were shut off.
