Houses At Slemmon Park Near Completion

In the course of a very few days all the houses in Slemmon Park will be occupied. When completed 256 Air Force families of R.C.A.F. Station Summerside will be living there.

The first group of 160 units was completed about a year ago and about the same time construction of the second group of 100 was commenced by the contractors, an affiliate of Eastern Woodworkers Ltd. of New Glasgow, N.S.

The total amount of both contracts was in the vicinity of one million seven hundred thousand dollars. Yesterday fifteen units remained to be turned over to the Air Force and these are lacking only laundry tubs. Only five men remain on the payroll of the contractor, approximately 160 labourers, carpenters and other tradesmen were given employment.

The exterior painting on a number of the buildings is not finished and this will be done in the spring. Mr. Dudley Mingo is the construction superintendent on the job and Mr. E. G. Allwright is the project inspector and engineer representing Central Housing and Mortgage Corporation, the crown company who gave out the contract.

Before summer arrives the people living in Slemmon Park are going to be thoroughly familiar with the more unpleasant characteristics of Island mud. The lack of snow and early mild weather has not helped the situation any. However, this spring will see the worst of it because the landscaping will be done this summer.

This will include the seeding and terracing of lawns and the laying of asphalt sidewalks. In Slemmon Park all kitchen doors open on the street and the front doors open on what will be a common lawn in the center of each block. This will be seeded and an asphalt sidewalk will be laid down the center of it and from this walk other walks will lead to the front doors of all the houses.

There will be no backyards as are common in most towns and cities but each house will front on a little park which will be lighted at night. It is hoped that the streets will be paved this summer.
