

Disabled Vessel With Lobsters Towed To Souris

"RECEPTION FOR CANDIDATES—The Progressive Conservative Women's Club of Montague and the surrounding area held a reception and tea at the Bison Rainbow Room on Wednesday afternoon for their candidates in Third and Fourth districts of King's. Present were S. Cameron Reid, William Whiteaway, W. R. Shaw and John A. MacDonald. Each spoke briefly on current issues and stressed that they were running a clean election. "The M.V. Veteran Explorer, a vessel bound from Grindstone in the Magdalen Islands to Souris, broke down about five miles from East Point on Wednesday night. Distress signals were sent out and when no response was received two of the crew members manned a dory and rowed over the five miles of choppy water to the lighthouse at East Point, where they got in contact with Souris. Captain Allison Outhouse was in port at the time discharging a cargo of fish from the dragger Donald and Eugene and immediately set out to aid the stranded vessel. He reached the Explorer about 10:30 a.m. and a line was put aboard. The dragger, with the crippled ship in tow, arrived at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday at Souris, where a number of trailer trucks were waiting to unload the cargo of 400 crates of live lobsters destined for Boston.

Prominent Georgetown Resident Dies

"The death occurred at his home on Water Street in Georgetown on Thursday, May 19, of William Maurice Donovan in his 81st year.

The deceased was born in Georgetown in 1875, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Donovan. In 1901 at the age of 16 years he entered the Dominion Government Marine Service as a steward on the C.G.S. Stanley. After a number of years on the Stanley he was for a short period assigned to service aboard the C.G.S. Earl Grey. He then joined the C.G.S. Guinere as chief steward and continued to fulfill those duties on the Guinere until the time of his retirement in 1924.

Between the years 1924 and 1942 he held the local agency for D. B. Steward insurance agencies of Charlottetown. In 1942 the late Mr. Donovan, accompanied by Mrs. Donovan, moved to Pictou, N.S., where he was employed as caretaker of Sir William Dawson School until 1952 at which time he returned to Georgetown where he has resided since.

The deceased was one of Georgetown's most highly regarded and best loved citizens. He adhered to and practised the finer qualities of citizenship and will long be remembered as a devoted husband and loving father.

Left to mourn are his wife, the former Lily DeCoste of Pictou, N.S., one son, John of Ferguson Industries Ltd. in Pictou, N.S., two daughters (Mildred) Mrs. Booth Scott of Ottawa, Ont., and (Helen) Mrs. Alex MacKinon of Georgetown.

The funeral will be held today at 9 a.m. from St. James Roman Catholic Church, of which the deceased was a devoted member. —A.C.

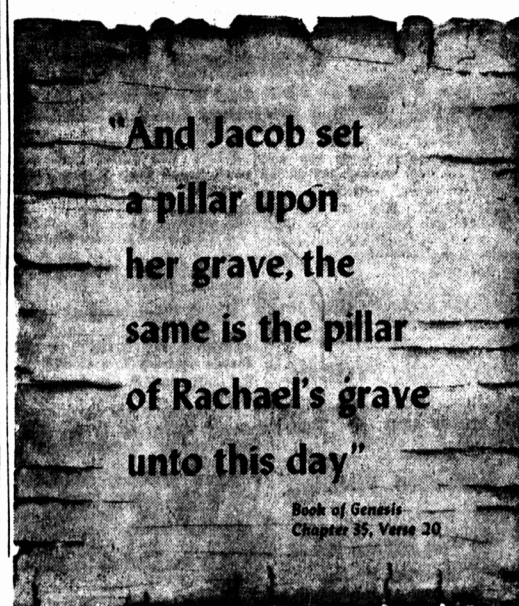

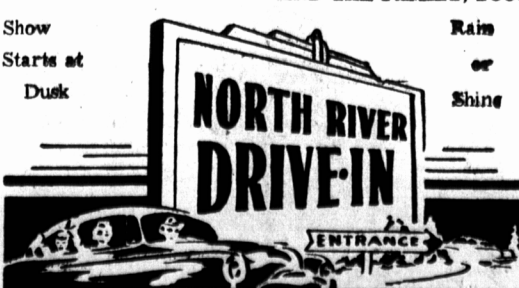

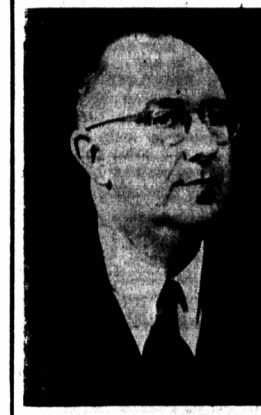

Teachers' Meeting

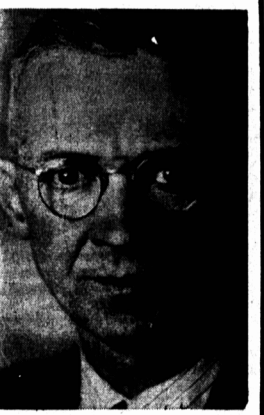

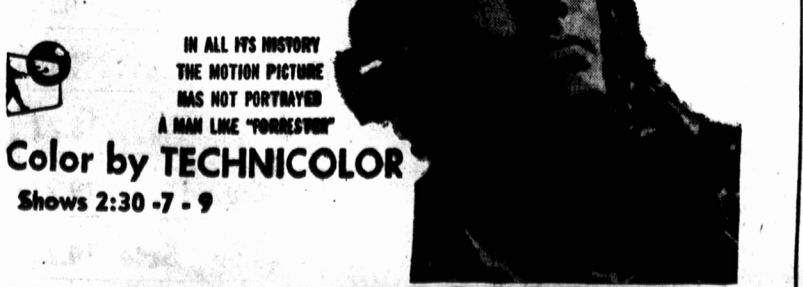
