Says Facts Misconstrued In U.S. Fish Import Quota

A large crowd was present at the Progressive Conservative meeting held at Victoria last night. Speakers at the meeting included Hon. George Hees, Minister of Transport; Hon. Angus MacLean, Minister of Fisheries; and Mr. Heath Macquarrie. Mr. George Rogers presided.

In referring to Hon. Dougald MacKinnon's statement in the Legislature recently with respect to the drop in the quota of fish from Canada to the United States Mr. MacLean said:

"The decline in the quota for 1958 was due to a decline in the average apparent consumption in the United States during the period of 1955-1957 and to no other factor. This is a purely mathematical calculation, and allegation that any action of the present Government affected markets for Canadian fish is a deliberate attempt to misconstrue facts. The U. S. quota of ground fish, filets and blocks from Canada and all other countries permitted at the reduced rate of 1 1/2 cents per pound as compared to the regular duty of 2 1/2 cents per pound is calculated at 15 per cent of the average aggregate apparent annual consumption in the U. S. of these products for the three years for which the quota is set. It might be pointed out the above formula was established in the Canada-U. S. Trade Agreement of 1939."

BACKS CAUSEWAY

Hon. George Hees, introduced by Mr. Macquarrie, referred to a letter in the Guardian of March 27 from Senator Thomas V. Grant, criticizing statements on public works projects made by John A. Macdonald. Mr. Hees said that the public works projects mentioned by Mr. Macdonald for Kings County were exactly those which will be done in the next twelve months. Mr. Hees also referred to the airfield runway extension and also to the causeway on which he said, "It is my own personal conviction it will be built and I will continue to lend my support because I am convinced it is needed."

Dr. Orville Phillips also spoke briefly stating, with reference to the adjournment of the House on Friday, March 21, when all the Conservative opposition were absent from the chamber, that if the Premier felt that it was difficult to carry on the business of the house without the Opposition present, the Conservatives would oblige him when he dared to call an election.

WEIGHT RESTRICTIONS PAVED ROADS

In order to properly protect the paved roads of Prince Edward Island, and at the same time impose the minimum weight restriction, the following shall apply effective midnight Thursday, 20th March, 1958:—

1. Vehicles registered for 16,000 lbs., or less, are permitted gross weight of 8,000 lbs.
2. Vehicles registered for over 16,000 lbs. are limited to one-half registered weight.

Principals For 2 City Schools Are Appointed
