While on the subject of "justice" we might remind players in the Island Senior "B" League that the league has become affiliated with the M.A.H.A. To do this the league has to be ready to part with 1 per cent of the gross gate of all games and to have registration requirements. In return the league gets a number of advantages including that of protection for referees. It may sound like a grim warning but it might do a lot of good if players remembered that the M.A.H.A. severely frowns upon referee-baiting and especially bodily attacks on referees and because of its affiliation with the C.A.H.A. a wayward player might find himself barred for life from organized hockey if such an attack occurred. It has happened before.
