

Yanks And Indians Start Two-Game Series Today

NEW YORK (AP) — Mickey Mantle will seek to emerge from his most protracted batting slump of the season tonight when Cleveland Indians take the opener of a two-game series.

Except for one day, his .362 mark is the lowest Mantle's had all season. After his third game of the campaign on April 19, Mickey was at an even .300. He cracked out three safeties the

next day, hiking his slate to .385 and he's been a brilliantly consistent performer since then.

With 42 home runs, the Yankee switch-hitter still is seven games ahead of Babe Ruth's record pace of 1927. But he has not connected in six contests.

Abe Greene Says Boxing At Low Ebb But Will Come Back

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Boxing is at its lowest ebb but it will come back because it is a basic sport, Abe Greene of Paterson, N.J., told the National Boxing Association at its meeting here Monday.

"There will be a gradual break from television and a return to the smaller clubs," Greene, former NBA president, declared.

"It is up to the states to help sponsor boxing through paternal and other groups and organizations," Green added. "We must stop being subservient to the TV networks and boxing promoters. The only regulatory body is each state commission and we dare not yield to outside agencies."

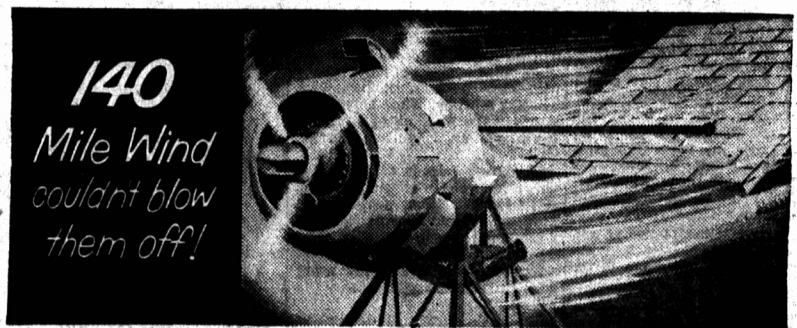
