NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Ominous preparations continue to be made by the Russian and Japan War Departments.

—Dullman, one of the Welland Canal dynamite suspects is protesting that he is "an American citizen." It appears that he is anxious about the result of a fair and just British trial.

—At last, after Parliament has been three months in session, we have the Postmaster General's report for the year ended June 30th, 1899—ten months ago! Yet there is in it nothing in particular. As men of business those who are now in office at Ottawa are decidedly slow.

—The Earl of Derry has sent Ottawa and Hull £1,000 with his sympathy; Lord Strathcona £25,000 and Lord Mount Stephen \$5,000; Chinese merchants in Victoria send \$500. Lord Lansdowne, the Duke of Fife and Prince of Wales all send deepest sympathy.

—The Laurier-Tarte government were pledged to reduce the debt of Canada, reduce the expenditure, collect less in taxes and provide better markets. They have increased the debt, increased the expenditure, collected more taxes, and failed to secure the slightest advantage not previously possessed in any market in the world.

—"Orator" Cook, one of the men wanted in connection with the Hamilton ballot frauds, is an Ontario Government employe. The Montreal Gazette remarks that between ballot-stuffing returning officers, blind sheriffs, pensioners and document-burning caretakers, the Ontario Government civil service list is assuming many of the characteristics of a rogues' gallery.

—It is significant of Mr. Percy Pope's rising popularity as a lecturer as well as of the interest of our community in a question of merely academic importance that the audience in Kindergarten Hall last evening was large and that the second delivery of the lecture on Lost Atlantis received close attention. Ex-Governor Howland occupied the chair. The vote of thanks was moved by Judge Fitzgerald and seconded by Judge Warburton.

—Chicago papers contain notices of the marriage of Dr. William D. H. Brown and Miss Gertrude Eastland, daughter of Mrs. Theodore Eastland. The Chicago Herald says that "the bride is a charming and unusually popular young woman." Dr. Brown is well known in Charlottetown as the third son of the late William Brown, Esq. He is now a prominent physician of Chicago and President of the Pure Food Company. We extend to Dr. and Mrs. Brown THE EXAMINER'S hearty and sincere congratulations.

—The friends and former Prince of Wales College mates of our townsman, William V. Newson, will be glad to hear that, besides getting the ordinary B. A. degree, he led his class in natural science, his honor course, leading in geology, paleontology, mineralogy, etc., leading in nine papers out of ten and getting five per cent. over all competitors in his honor subjects. All the Islanders have done well. This speaks volumes for the equipment received from Dr. Anderson and his staff at the Prince of Wales College. The achievement is one to be remembered, for Messrs. Newson, Willis and McMillin accomplished the feat in three years which ordinarily takes four.

—The Prince of Wales acknowledges the sympathy and congratulations from all parts of the world on his recent escape from assassination, in a letter just made public, as follows:

"I have been deeply touched by the numerous expressions of sympathy and good will addressed to me upon the occasion of the Providential escape of the Princess of Wales and myself from the danger we have lately passed through, from every quarter of the globe. From the Queen's subjects throughout the world, as well as from the representatives and inhabitants of foreign countries, have these manifestations proceeded, and on my return journey I received a welcome so spontaneous and hearty that I felt it was the recipient of the most gratifying tribute of genuine goodwill. Such a proof of kindness and generous feeling is, naturally, most highly prized by me and will be forever cherished in my memory."

THE OTTAWA-HULL FIRE.

Messages of Sympathy From the Queen and Mr. Chamberlain.

The following are copies of cablegrams received by His Excellency Lord Minto:—

LONDON, April 27.—From Rt. Hon. Jos. Chamberlain to the Governor-General:

I have received with the deepest concern your message reporting the disastrous fire at Ottawa. I am sure the people of the Mother Country would be glad to have an opportunity for contributing to the relief of the misery and destitution caused to their fellow subjects in Canada by this calamity and I propose to ask the Lord Mayor to open a fund for this purpose.

From Rt. Hon. J. Chamberlain to the Governor-General:

Her Majesty has heard with deep regret of the great fire at Ottawa and has commanded me to desire you to convey to the immediate sufferers and to her people in Canada an expression of heartfelt sympathy in the calamity which has befallen them. She trusts that there has been no loss of life and would be glad to have any further particulars you can furnish.
