Halifax Square Dancing Team Places Second

TORONTO, (CP) — Gunter Buchta's Corteen square dance team of Halifax placed second in junior square dance competition at the Royal Winter Fair here during the week-end.

Dorothy Tresham's Square-ettes of Hamilton were first, three points ahead of the Halifax group.

Buchta's group was given 455 points of a possible 600.

Eighteen groups from various parts of Canada took part. Competition was held Friday and Saturday, with finals Saturday afternoon.

The Halifax group, which topped square dance competitions in the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst, N.S., earlier this month, took part in a floor show at the Royal York Hotel here after Saturday's competition.

Agriculture Minister Mackenzie of Nova Scotia and Education Minister Hicks were on hand to watch the competitions.

Holstein Sales At Royal Fair

TORONTO, Nov. 23 — The first Holstein sale of the stars featuring some 35 Royal Winter Fair prize winners established a new Canadian auction record for the breed. Thirty-five head brought \$74,500, for an average of \$2,128. Top price was \$8,000.

South American buyers provided the spark that set the bidding afire. The first four animals in the ring each went to a different country. Rockwood Anthony Robinson, an eight-month-old bull calf consigned by Rockwood Holsteins of St. Norbert, Manitoba, brought \$7,500 on the bid of Antonio Masurel of Vuelta Chica, Argentina. When the first prize two-year-old bull at the Royal went into the ring, Glenarfon Nugget, consigned by J. J. E. McCague of Alliston, Ont., he topped the first figure by going at \$8,000 to D. F. Merelles of Sao Paulo, Brazil.

Next in line was the first prize junior yearling bull, a Fond Hope son offered by Ross Segaworth, Freeman, Ont., and purchased by L. N. Izquierdo, Bogota, Colombia, at \$3,000.

Rosendo Aja of Mexico City bought Illheee Sovereign Supreme, the reserve grand champion at the Royal from H. C. McCloskey, of Queensville, Ont., at \$2,600.

An added and uncatagorized bull entry was the winning junior bull calf at the Royal, consigned by Pickard and Clark, Acme, Alberta, and purchased by J. R. Henderson, Kingston, Ont., for \$1,400. Mr. Henderson was runner-up on the \$7,500 bull. The five bulls offered thus averaged \$4,500.

Top price for a female was \$5,000 paid by Martin Bros., Buenos Aires, Argentina, to Rosaf Farms, Brampton, for Rosaf Shamrock Ivy Queen, a daughter of A. B. C. Reflection Sovereign, who was first prize winner at the C. N. E. and third prize milking two-year-old at the Royal.

The third prize aged dry cow, a Skyrocket daughter, consigned by Rockwood Holsteins, brought \$4,000 going to Cabanas y Tambos, San Miguel, Argentina. The fourth prize dry aged cow, also a Skyrocket daughter, was taken by A. Seiling, Elmira, at \$3,500.

The \$3,500 figure was again reached when W. K. McLeod, of Thetford Mines, Que., paid this amount to T. R. Dent & Son, Woodstock, Ont., for the bred heifer Springbank Polly M, who was the junior champion at the Royal. McLeod also bought the second prize senior yearling at the Royal from F. Roy Ormiston, Brooklin, Ont., and E. Oyler, Fort Perry, at \$2,800. In addition he paid \$2,200 to G. H. Walker & Son, Fort Perry, for the second prize dry two-year-old.

Altogether ten head went to Latin American buyers. Thirteen head brought over \$2,000 while 26 head brought at least \$1,000 each. This is the first time that there have been as many four figure animals sold in a Canadian Holstein auction.

Thirteen milking females averaged \$2,346; 11 bred heifers \$1,404; five open yearlings \$840; one heifer calf \$1,060; and a calf born at the fair, to a Rockwood heifer that sold for \$2,350, went for \$800.

Shively, Springfield, to Rockwood Holsteins; \$1,560 paid by R. J. Graham, Alexandria, Ont., to Rosaf Farms; \$1,460 paid by Rafael Pereyra of Argentina, to Rosaf Farms; \$1,300 paid by Pickard and Clark, Alberta, to Est. of A. D. Fleming, Reabro, Ont.; \$1,050 paid by Rafael Pereyra to Albert Selling, Elmira; \$1,050 paid by Fred Baer, Fort Plain, N. Y., to W. K. McRae, Howick, Que.; \$1,000 paid by Luis de Ruder, Buenos Aires, to Orvan Chambers, Wilfrid, Ont.; and \$1,000 paid by J. M. Fraser, Streetsville, Ont., to Earl H. Moore, Orton, Ont.

Reports Missing Airwoman Found

OTTAWA, (CP) — LAW Isobel Burton of the RCAF, who vanished without trace April 15, 1952, has turned up safely at Victoria and is being questioned by RCAF police, it was disclosed Monday.

Major Gen. G. R. Peakes, VC (PC-Esquamalt-Saanich) arose in the Commons on a question of privilege to express appreciation "for the thorough and prolonged endeavors of both service and

civilian police which have resulted in the recovery of this missing person."

The RCAF confirmed that Miss Burton, 26, had returned to the RCAF station at Pat Bay, B. C., near Victoria.

Gen. Peakes told a reporter later that apparently Miss Burton returned to the RCAF of her own accord. He could throw no light on where she had been for the last year.

Miss Burton vanished from the RCAF station at Aymer, Ont., at Easter in 1952. Her parents live in Saskatchewan but she had lived since childhood with Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Sims of Victoria, her foster-parents.

British Gov't TV Plan Due For Hot Debate

LONDON, (CP) — A government plan to give British competitive television, complete with commercials, goes before the House of Lords today and it's due for a rough reception.

Former foreign secretary Lord Halifax, leader of a solid core of rebellious Conservative peers, has tabled a motion opposing the plan and most of the 63 Labor peers are on record against it. Chances are that many of the 85 Liberals in the House will line up with them.

The government proposal, as outlined in a recent white paper, is to set up a second corporation, similar to the BBC, to supervise commercial television. This corporation, as yet unnamed, would lease transmitter facilities to private companies which would in turn produce programs to sell time to advertisers.

The corporation, to be under the direction of a government-appointed board of governors and answerable to Postmaster General Lord de la Warr, would set up and maintain standards of taste for both programs and commercials.

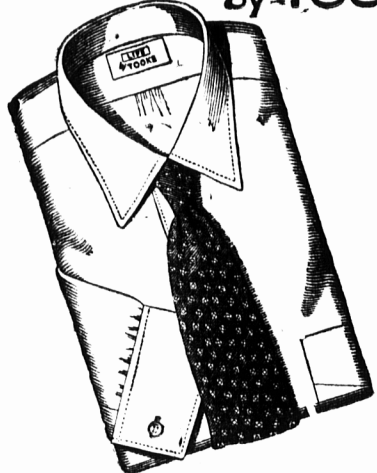

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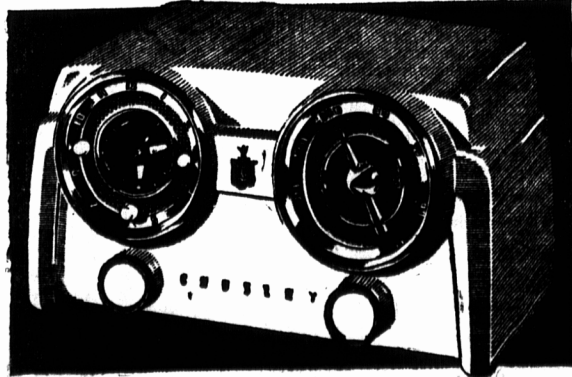
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
