

Glance Bay Comes From Behind In Third For 5-2 Victory Over Islanders

GLANCE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Glance Bay Miners fired four unanswered goals in the third period to defeat Charlottetown Islanders 5-2 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday night.

The loss left the Islanders in the cellar, as third place Glance Bay advanced to within five points of second place Sydney Millionaires, who lost 5-3 to the leading Halifax Atlantics. Jim Farrell paced Miners with two markers, and Kevin Rochford, Norm Connelly and Gordie Myles got the rest. Spike Laliberte and Orin Carver tallied for Islanders.

Glance Bay fired the only goal of the first period and Charlottetown tallied twice to lead 2-1 at the end of the second.

The last half of the second was devoted to rough stuff. Peanuts McLaughlin was tagged with a misconduct at 12:34 and four minutes later Gordie Miller took one of the same. Vince Palladino and Cooper Leyte squared off at the 18:55 mark for the worst rhybur of the game. Ford Fires 2 Goals For MMHL Scoring Record As Halifax Defeats Sydney

HALIFAX, (CP) — Bill Ford made Maritime Major Hockey League history Saturday night by firing two goals to set a new season record of 130 points as he led Halifax Atlantics to a 5-3 win over Sydney Millionaires.

Ford's goals, his 69 and 70th of the season, also set a scoring record.

Ford began the game tied with the 128 total points record set by Charlottetown Islanders' Buck Whitlock in the 1949-50 season when he was with Saint John Beavers of the old Big Four. Ford broke Whitlock's record of 64 goals a week ago.

Atlantics' win stretched their lead over second place Sydney to six points.

Besides Ford, Pete Wywrot, Bob Pepin, and Doug McPhee tallied for Halifax. Sydney marksmen were Charlie Marshall, Eliot Specs Chorley and Harvey McDonald.

Sydney took a 2-1 lead in the first period after Marshall fired the first goal. Halifax tallied twice in the second and outscored Mills 2-1 in the finale.

The Welshmen scored the first two goals of the game and the first period ended 2-1 in their favor. They were never headed until Paul Schurman made it 6-5 for the Aces on the prettiest goal of the night with two minutes left in the final frame. The P. W. C. boys struck back in 30 seconds to tie it up, but Gallant's pay-off counter came less than a minute later with two seconds left of the game.

After the Aces had tied it up 2-2 in the middle session, P. W. C. scored two quick goals while Paul Schurman was sitting out a penalty for holding, and the period ended 4-3 for the college boys. The Aces scored five goals to P.W.C.'s two in the third period to edge the visitors in a typical "Merrillwell" finish.

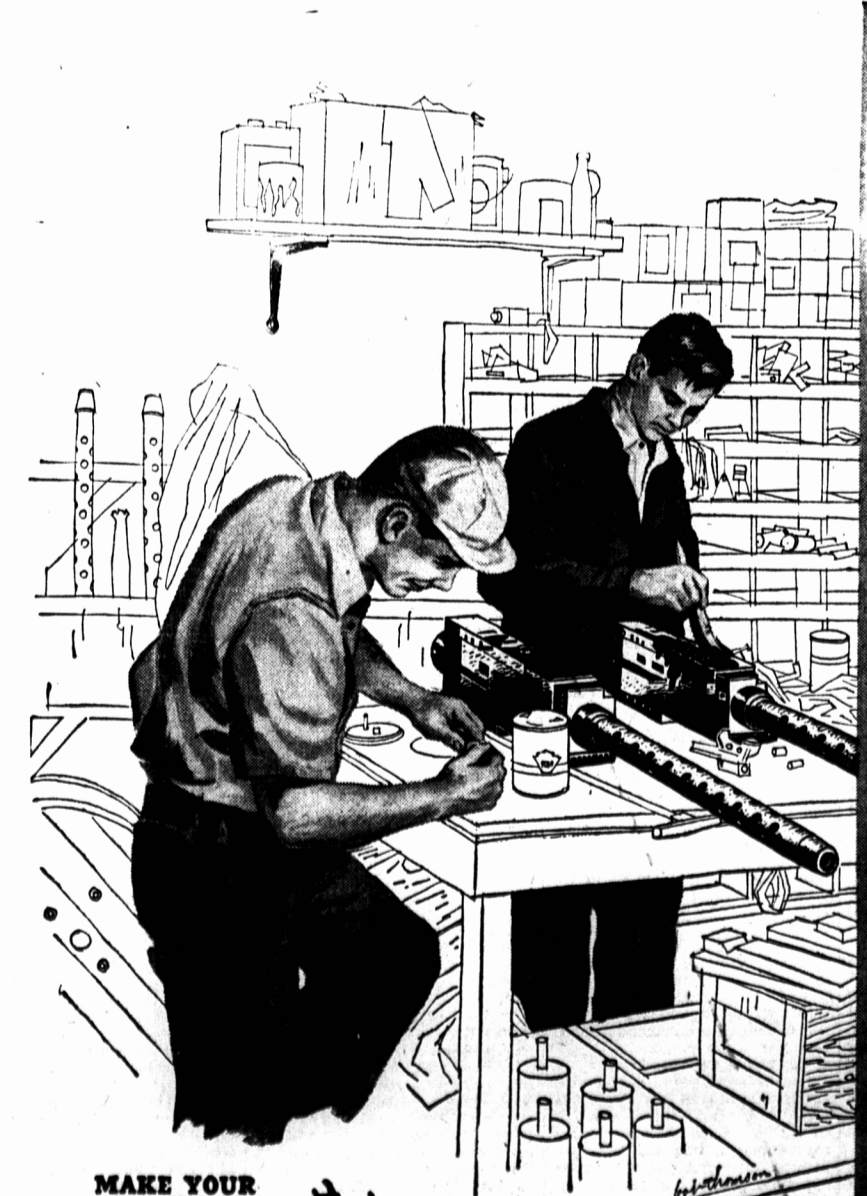
