2 tablespoons tart mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons fresh herbs, remove any bones; chop herring very fine. Add chopped egg, chives and cayenne. Turn into serving dish; refrigerate 1 hour or more. Serve with smoked fish, cold meat, bread and butter, cheese and cold pudding, a Christmas tradition.
