Quite a business is carried on in the smelt and eel trade by some of our local men. They realize from 8 to 10c in New York at present with prospects of their going up.

Most of the farmers about here slaughtered their pork this fall, owing mostly to the fact that no accommodation was afforded to ship at E. lot's as last year. Most of them think that it pays better to slaughter before selling.

### COUNTY COURT.

The Court met in Charlottetown from 27th December last until Monday, 9th inst, when it was adjourned until Saturday next for delivery of judgments in suits reserved. The docket consisted of about 150, cases of which a number were tried. Among these may be mentioned the following:

Inland Navigation Company, Limited, vs John H. Wonnacott, action for hire of steamer Jacques Gartier, \$40. Defendant hired the steamer for a picnic excursion for the Sons of England to Crapaud and back on 16th August last. The defence was (1) that he acted as agent, (2) that the steamer in returning left behind the caterer and several of his party. The Jury held that defendant contracted personally, and that the steamer having waited until half-past six o'clock and having whistled repeatedly, the loss of the trip by the caterer and his party was due to their own neglect. Judgment was therefore given for plaintiffs. Haszard, Q C, for plaintiff; McLean, Q C, for defendant.

Walter P Doull vs. the City of Charlottetown, action for preparing plans and specification for repairs to fire alarm, \$25. Plaintiff claimed that he was instructed by the Fire Board to do this work. The defence was that the work was not authorized by the City Council and that the Fire Board had no authority to contract. On this ground the plaintiff was non-suited. Haszard, Q C, for City.

James Cowan and others vs Frank K Nelson, action for pro est fees on bills of exchange. Defendant claimed that he was overcharged on these fees. Judgment for defendant \$1.94 and costs. Moore for plaintiffs, Stewart, Q C, for defendant.

Hamilton Higgins vs Augustus Mason. In this action plaintiff claimed \$46 under the following facts: On the 8th November last he bought a mare from defendant for that sum. On the same day Robert Horton took the beast from him on the Main Street in Charlottetown claiming her as his property. It appeared in evidence that Horton and defendant had attended together Mr. Brenton Longworth's auction sale of stock, and that Horton bought two horses there, this mare being one. A joint note was given for their purchase, signed by Horton and defendant. Defendant claimed that Horton acted in the matter as his agent and under his instructions, while Horton claimed that they bought the horses on joint account and that one belonged to each. It was afterwards agreed, as he alleged, that the mare should be his. During the progress of the trial the parties made a settlement, and the suit was withdrawn. Johnston for plaintiff; Stewart, Q C, for defendant.

Samuel Gay vs. Herbert Carver, action for goods sold, \$17. Judgment for \$8 18. Haszard, Q C, for defendant.

NATURAL HISTORY.—The meeting held in the Y M C A parlor last evening to reorganize the Natural History Society was very well attended. Mr John Newson occupied the chair and Mr L W Wat on acted as Secretary. After some discussion, it was decided to reorganize under the name of the Prince Edward Island Natural History and Antiquarian Society; and officers for the coming year were elected as follows: President John Newson; Vice President, John MacSwain; Secy-Treas., L W Watson, these officers constitute the Executive Committee with the following: Judge Alley, Miss Pippy and Messrs Bulman and Seaman. The prospective work of the Society was discussed at some length, and a committee was appointed to draw up a constitution to be submitted at a meeting to be held in the same place on the 24th inst. The meeting was very enthusiastic and the future of the society looks bright.

### JOTTINGS FROM MARSHFIELD.

#### Pleasant Social—Benefit of Farmer's and Dairymen's Association.

A very successful basket social and entertainment, under the management of Marshfield Farmer's Club, was held on the evening of the 2nd inst, in the Marshfield Hall, in aid of the P. E. Island Hospital fund. Despite the inclemency of the weather and the inconvenience of the travelling occasioned by a recent storm, the hall was comfortably filled and quite a creditable number of baskets, very artistically decorated, was speedily exchanged for cash by our deservedly popular and genial friend, Mr. Fred Horn, who acted as auctioneer, in which capacity he gave general satisfaction, culminating the occasion with some decidedly amusing remarks. LIQUOR REGULATION ACT.—Two charges of violating the Liquor Regulations Act occupied the attention of His Honor this morning. Laura C Smith, convicted of keeping her saloon open after hours, was fined \$5 or 20 days imprisonment. Thos. Murray, for selling in a room not fitted up according to law, was fined \$100 and costs or three month's imprisonment.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.—Many persons in Summerside and elsewhere throughout this province will hear with regret that Mr. Arthur L. Calhoun was accidentally killed at Wolfville, N. S., yesterday. According to a despatch, Mr. Calhoun recently built a cornmeal mill at Wolfville, and while superintending the unloading of a cargo of corn he fell from a staging to the wharf below, striking on his head, with fatal results.

HOCKEY.—Hockey is now on the boom all over Canada, and particularly in St John and Halifax, as witnessed in the late Wanderer-Crescent and Mohawk-Neptune matches in these two mentioned cities. Charlottetown will not be behind hand, and the opening of the hockey season will occur here on next Wednesday evening, when the Stars of Summerside will play the Crescents of this city, the first match in the newly formed intermediate league for the cup donated by Mr A A Bartlett. On the same evening the Boys Britannia Club of Summerside will play the Boys Anchor Club of Charlottetown, and thus there will be two matches for one admission. ACCIDENT ON THE ICE.—Yesterday afternoon about six o'clock, Mr Murdoch McLeod and his daughter Florrie, of Riverdale, started to cross the North River ice on their way home from Charlottetown. When about 100 yards from the shore, however, the horse broke through the ice. Mr. McLeod and his daughter jumped from the sleigh, which was also going down, and Mr McLeod tried to save the horse. Whilst he was thus engaged, Miss McLeod broke through the ice two or three times, the last time sinking to her neck. Col. Moore, who lives near by, witnessed the accident and hastening to the scene assisted in rescuing the young lady from her perilous position. Mr Villard also assisted, and later on Mr David Ingles and his son did what they could. The horse could not be saved. Miss McLeod was kindly cared for at the residence of Col. Moore. She suffered considerably from the shock and the wetting she received, but no serious consequences are expected.
