### LA GRANDE DUCHESSE

#### Arrival Early This Morning—Visited by Many of our Citizens.

The floating palace of the Plant Steamship Line, La Grande Duchesse, arrived from Boston, via Halifax and Hawkesbury, about one o'clock this morning and moored at the head of the Plant wharf. Notwithstanding the late hour at which the steamer arrived there were hundreds of people on the wharf to receive her.

Today, despite the unfavorable weather, a good many persons took advantage of the opportunity of visiting the ship, and were delighted with the vessel, a minute description of which was given in THE EXAMINER yesterday. While the visitors were going on board the steaming fell, precipitating a number of ladies and gentlemen to the wharf. Fortunately there were no very serious consequences. One gentleman was stunned.

In point of equipment and interior arrangement La Grande Duchesse takes high rank. Every detail has been attended to, and everything is of the best. All who have seen the steamer are pleased with her.

There were 175 passengers for Charlottetown. The number of people anxious to come from Boston by her was so great that accommodation could not be provided for them. Already staterooms have been engaged as far ahead as September.
