OUR NEWS BUDGET for OUR SATURDAY SUBSCRIBERS

MONDAY

The following wire from Mr. E. P. Hopkins, secretary of the Board of Transport Commissioners, Ottawa was received Friday night by Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, chairman of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board: "Board today approved agreed charge contract on potatoes."

This action, Mr. MacDonald states, is the result of concerted effort made during the last several years to obtain some relief from the ever increasing transportation costs which the Island potato movement had to bear. Over a year ago, as a result of the prospective development of other transportation factors the Canadian National Railway instituted a water and truck competitive rate from Island shipping points to Ontario and Quebec destinations west of Lewis and Diamond Junction.

A new type of street lighting is being tried out on Kent Street by the Maritime Electric Company on request of the Light Committee of the City Council. The installation is a single unit of a mercury vapor non-glare light which may at sight be compared with the standard installations in the area. This type of light is used extensively in the business sections in larger centres, but used more sparingly in the residential areas.

TUESDAY

"This year's epidemic has been the worst since 1946", said Dr. T. Gencheff at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Polio Chapter held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. Dr. Gencheff pointed out that seventy six cases have been reported to date with four fatalities and of the remaining seventy-two cases, about twenty-five percent may be regarded as having severe muscle involvement, fifty percent mild muscle involvement. The remaining twenty-five percent may be regarded as abortive cases with no residual weakness.

The preliminary hearing of John Francis Cecil Molyneux charged with manslaughter was held yesterday before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at the Court House in Charlottetown.

They were Doctors MacLeod, Bonshaw; Murchison, Hunter River; Lea and Laidlaw, Charlottetown; Emmet Noonan, Mrs. Emmet Noonan, Wallace McKenna, Mrs. Erwin Cousins, Roy Molyneux, Harold Hennessey, Mrs. Roy Molyneux, Winifred Matheon, and Georgina Richards.

The five-year rural electrification program, which the government announced last year and which got under way during the past summer, will probably be completed in three years, Premier A. W. Matheson said at Lunenburg last night. He was speaking during ceremonies connected with energizing the eight miles of new line between Bay Fortune and Annandale.

The ceremony began at 7.30 when Mr. George A. Saville, Liberal member of the legislature for the Fifth District of King's, instructed a Maritime Electric Co. employee to close a switch turning current into the new line. That part of the function took place beside the highway at Bay Fortune. The large number of spectators then proceeded by car to the hall at Annandale, Mr. Saville's home district, for the remainder of the ceremony.

Mr. Leo McIsaac, former member of the Central Selling Agency of the P. E. Island Potato Marketing Board was the main speaker at a well conducted meeting of the potato growers at Souris last night. An overflow crowd assembled from all parts of the area to hear and take part in the discussions regarding the potato plebiscite to be held Nov. 10.

Mr. McIsaac dealt briefly with the history and set up of the Potato Board and selling agency, stating that among its other aims, it was to attempt to regulate the price and movement of potatoes. He reviewed past methods which had attempted to do this but showed that none had been successful. "The present policy," he said, "had proved to be a good plan, and with due support was assured of success."

Major John A. MacDonald of Cardigan and Mr. Walter R. Shaw, former deputy minister of agriculture, last night were the unanimous choice of a Progressive Conservative Party nominating convention at Cardigan. Major MacDonald is the assemblyman candidate and Mr. Shaw the councillor.

The annual meeting of the Third King's Progressive Conservative Association, and the annual meeting of the King's County Progressive Conservative Association were held in conjunction with the convention.

In an atmosphere which was frequently heated by sharp debate, heckling, and interruptions, Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, at Alberton last evening outlined the reasons which the board believes are necessary to the establishing of the selling system which has been referred to as the compulsory pool.

Some 300-400 persons filled the Institute Hall to capacity, and while the great majority of those present appeared to support the plan proposed by the board, a small group of opponents made frequent interruptions and at times completely ignored the plea of the chairman, Mr. W. B. McLellan, for conduct of the meeting in an orderly manner.

WEDNESDAY

The proposed policies of the Potato Marketing Board were outlined by Mr. Leo P. McIsaac last night at a well attended potato meeting in Mount Stewart Hall. One of the features of the meeting was a question and answer period with most of the questions being asked by Messrs. Russell Clark, M.L.A., Mount Stewart, Ira Lewis, York and Harry MacLaughlin, Stanhope.

Messrs. Harvey Douglas, M.L.A., Roland MacDonald, President of the Provincial Federation of Agriculture, E. D. Reid and Harold Lacey also spoke. Mr. Joseph Fisher of Scotchfort presided.

In his remarks Mr. McIsaac recalled that the Potato Marketing Board had been set up in 1950 for three reasons. (1) To carry out a disease control program for potatoes. (2) To conduct a promotional and advertising campaign to publicize Island potatoes. (3) To do something about the marketing problem and try to improve the prices.

Brigadier W. W. Reid, D.S.O., E. D. was the guest of honor at a testimonial dinner given by the officers of the Charlottetown Garrison held Wednesday evening at the Charlottetown Hotel.

The dinner was presided over by the Garrison Mess president, Major Temple Hooper. The chairman called upon Brigadier G. G. E. Fenke, D.S.O., E.D., who read and presented an illuminated address to Brigadier and Mrs. Reid. This was followed by the presentation of three lamps by Major Roy D. MacGillivray, and also a bouquet of American Beauty roses presented by Mrs. Fenke to Mrs. Reid. The above was on behalf of the Garrison Officers of the Reserve Militia of P.E.I.

THURSDAY

H. A. Russell, president of the Fisheries Council of Canada was guest speaker at the annual dinner meeting of the P. E. Island Fisheries Federation held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night which was presided over by Emmett Gallant, vice president.

Mr. Russell gave a comprehensive talk on conditions in Newfoundland before and since entering the Canadian Confederation, touching on the economy of the new province generally.

Spring Park Village is to have a new fire hall. A motion granting the commissioners authority to negotiate a loan to the amount of \$6,000 for the acquisition of a lot of a land and for the erection of a building 24' x 32' was approved at a special meeting of the rate payers held last night. Mr. J. Edmund Arsenault, chairman of the Commissioners presided.

Wednesday evening an Island-wide Rally of the Presbyterian Young People's Societies was held in Zion Church Hall with approximately one hundred and fifty young people in attendance. The devotional period, conducted by the Presbytery executive, was led by the President, Roddie Hickox. The Scripture lesson, Ephesians 4:1-16, was read by David MacEachern. Irene Mountain and George Johnston led in prayer.

A hotly debated potato meeting, called to consider various aspects of the potato industry was held in Hunter River Hall last night. The meeting was presided over by Andrew Stevenson of Elliotts.

McIsaac, Mr. Gillespie, a former Western Canada Farmer now living in the Hunter River area, Mr. MacDonald, former member on the Marketing Board and Messrs. E. D. Reid, Charlottetown, Austin Scates, FreeTown, H. B. Willis, Charlottetown, Lloyd MacLeod, Brookfield and Harry MacLaughlin, Covehead.

Mrs. Reginald Buell of Montague, 49-year-old mother of four, won \$36,000 yesterday on the first Irish Sweepstake ticket she ever bought.

She held a ticket on Queens Beaches the horse finishing second in the race. She was the highest Canadian money winner in the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes which were held in England on Tuesday night.

"I can't believe it," were her first words on being informed of her good fortune by a Guardian reporter in Iris yesterday afternoon.

"There's a trip in store for us," stated the happy Mrs. Buell in her modest comfortable Montague home last night. It will be her first trip out of the Province and one which she thinks she deserves.

Sitting around the stove in the family kitchen last night Mrs. Buell recounted the steps leading up to the unexpected bonanza. She and her 55-year-old husband Reginald, a carpenter who is working at Central Creameries in Charlottetown, had been planning for a long time to buy an Irish Sweepstake ticket. A couple of months ago they made up their minds. Reggie bought two tickets, one for himself and one for his wife.

Little more thought was given to the tickets until last week when Mrs. Buell received a telegram informing her that her ticket had been drawn for the race. Yesterday morning she and her daughter, Betty Margaret drove down to Iris to visit Mrs. Buell's parents.

"I never thought that I would get any word until about Friday," she stated last night. When Harold (Landry) offered me congratulations yesterday afternoon I thought he was referring to the same telegram. Then he told me how much I won and I couldn't believe it. My father was so excited he could hardly talk.

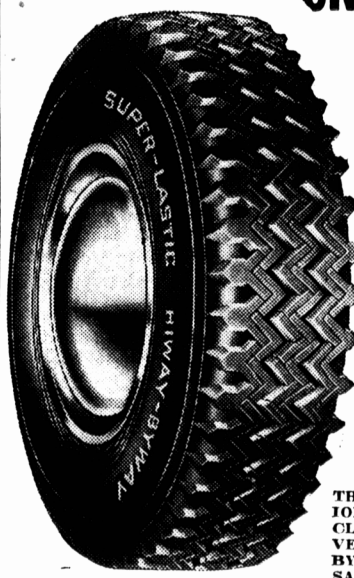
