DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debates and Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 5.

After routine, Hon. Mr. Foster in reply to Sir Richard Cartwright, explained the terms of the prospectus of the loan of 1888, but Sir Richard was not satisfied, and said he would bring up the matter again when going into supply.

The bill amending the Fisheries Act was read a second time. It provides that the use of nets or other apparatus for capturing salmon shall be confined to tidal waters, and that no one shall fish for or catch salmon with a swing net in any of the waters of Canada.

Mr. Jones, of Halifax, made a lengthy attack on its manner of doing business, to which Mr. Kenny replied with fine effect. Mr. Weldon, of St. John, also pitched in hotly, charging discrimination in freight rates against New Brunswick.

Sir John defended the Intercolonial, showing that its great object was to link the Provinces together. It was not operated solely on commercial considerations.

After recess, the Canadian Pacific Railway Bill, so long held over, was committed.

Mr. Edgar said he did not consider it necessary to move the amendment of which he had given notice, but would offer some general observations, which he did for thirty minutes.

Mr. Jones, of Halifax, followed, arguing strongly in favor of compelling the Canadian Pacific to build the Short Line from Salisbury.

Sir John said the Government had come to an agreement with the C. P. R., by which the road from Harvey to Salisbury would be built. (Applause.)

Mr. Mills objected to throwing further burdens on the country by building 120 miles of railway, because Sir Charles Tupper had promised it without authority. He concluded with an old-time blue ruin harangue.

Sir John said there was no reason for Mr. Mills to deliver a lecture on constitutional law. He had tried to avoid a useless discussion on Mr. Jones' amendment, but he could not to-night give particulars of the short agreement. This, however, was no reason to stop this private bill. The bill was of great importance to the Company and ought to pass at once.

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The Mayor of Quebec, at the head of seventy-five delegates, waited on the Privy Council to-day, asking the Government to guarantee the interest of three millions for twenty-five years at four per cent., for the erection of the Quebec bridge. The Premier did not hold out any hope that the request would be complied with.

Boulanger's Manifesto.

PARIS, April 5.

Boulanger has issued a manifesto, dated Brussels, April 5. He says that in their robust sense the electors know how to deal with the tissue of falsehoods and abominable slanders against him. The Government extorted from an infatuated Parliament a consent to prosecute him before a court of political enemies, not a court of judges.

Lonsdale's Travels.

PHILADELPHIA, April 5.

The Inquirer to-morrow will print the story of Lord Lonsdale's travels. Lonsdale estimates that he travelled by dog-sled and on foot about 1,000 miles from Winnipeg in a little more than a year. He arrived at Nashakesg Mission, lat 59 north, 158 west, Dec. 15th of last year. This was the farthest point north he reached.

The Scott Act Defeat.

TORONTO, April 5.

The temperance people here say they are not much discouraged over the defeat of the Scott Act yesterday. They add that the Act was not their making and they could never get it repealed, amended or enforced by the parliament that passed it. Possibly the trouble the attempt at enforcement gave the Ontario Government may have swelled the majority for repeal, but the result was due chiefly to the hopelessness of getting it to work effectively. An agitation will now be concentrated on a line of general prohibition.

Merchants who have lately returned from Europe agree in saying that there will be a regular boom in the lumber business here the coming summer.
