HOW THEY GROW.

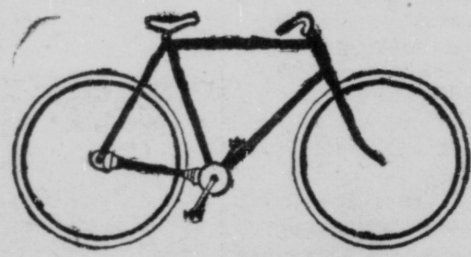
For 1895-97, the main estimates of the Dominion Government amounted to \$41,647,921; for 1897-98, to \$44,607,238; for 1898-99, \$41,912,571; for 1899-00 \$46,286,550. That is to say, the estimated expenditure for the next year amount to \$4,683,609 more than those of four years ago. Remember that the men who compose the Government obtained many votes at the general election on account of their denunciations of "Tory extravagance," and their promise to reduce the expenditures by three or four millions! Remember, also, that the supplementary estimates in which we are so deeply interested, are yet to be brought down.

HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE.

THE Patriot argues that because members of the Opposition asked for information concerning the arrangement said to have been made with the Dominion Government, and grumbled because they didn't get it; and because they suggested that the cost of the traffic part of the bridge should come out of the \$2,000,000 which, in equity, the Dominion owes the Province,—therefore they are opposed to the bridge. The unreasonableness of this argument will at once be seen. A man who proposes to build a house is not considered a fool because he first sits down to count the cost thereof and see where the money is to come from. Nor would he be thought unreasonable if, upon entering into an agreement as to its construction with one who owes him a large sum of money, he should stipulate that the work and materials supplied by the debtor should, as far as possible, be paid for by the reduction of the debt. Neither can the Opposition be denounced as opposed to the Hillsborough bridge because of the suggestions they have made in regard to the agreement with the Dominion Government concerning construction and maintenance. In point of fact, the Opposition are just as much in favor of the bridge, together with the Belfast and Murray Harbor railway, as the Government can possibly be, and just as much interested in having a satisfactory arrangement to this end entered into with the Dominion Government.

The Patriot prates about "the terms offered by the Dominion Government." What are these terms? The Patriot cannot tell. The Patriot like the Government, is "going it blind." If the Province should come out of the business without heavy expenditures which might have been avoided, the fact will be due to the generosity of the Dominion authorities rather than to the prudence of the Fairbairn administration. At the present, time as to this matter, the Dominion Government has this Province completely before the wind.

THE MONTH'S RECORD.—During the month of April there were 22 convictions for drunkenness before Stipendiary Magistrate Hazard. There were also 2 convictions for assault, and 1 each for malicious injuries to property, Liquor Regulation Act, larceny and interfering with police. One drunk was dismissed. One case of forgery was sent to the Supreme Court.

TWO INSTANCES.

THE papers contain many reports of many instances of electioneering rascality in Brockville. We select two instances. The following, from the Brockville Times, refers to one of the numerous tricks resorted to in the recent bye election:

"A large number of ballots marked for Hon. Mr. White on Thursday in the west ward were refused in the count because they were marked with a red lead pencil. "Apart from the fact that the ballots were perfectly legitimate and should have been counted for Mr. White, the public would like to know how this pencil juggling business occurred. One of the voters who marked his ballot for Mr. White with the red lead pencil, has informed the Brockville Times that the only pencil visible in the polling booth was a red lead pencil, and he is naturally very indignant that his vote has been refused.

The following is part of a Brockville despatch to the Montreal Gazette:

"A farmer residing in a polling booth in Elizabethtown gave some interesting notes at the Conservative headquarters. He stated that opposite the polling booth where he resided was a small building where a number of Grit hoodlums held forth. The voters were first marched into this place, given a ballot already marked and initialed with instructions to deposit this ballot in the box and return the blank one, received from the deputy returning officer, whereupon they were paid \$10 each. This farmer was one of the number of voters who followed out the programme partially. He marked the ballot given him by the deputy returning officer and retained possession of the other which is now in the hands of Mr. White's friends. The farmer laid bare the plan after he had voted and was immediately surrounded by a crowd of anxious Liberals, one of whom offered him \$100 for the bogus ballot."

The Ottawa Citizen of the 21st inst., contains the following paragraph which will be interesting to the many friends of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Stumbles and their family in this city: "The residence of Mr. W. W. Stumbles, of the marine and fisheries department, on Maria street, was yesterday afternoon the scene of a pleasing event, being the marriage of his eldest daughter to Mr. John A. Robertson, manager of the electrical works in Yankleek Hill. The marriage ceremony was performed by the Rev. W. Timberlake, in the parlor, which was very beautifully decorated with flowers. The bride looked charming. She wore a fawn colored traveling dress, trimmed with white satin and pearl passementerie, with orange blossoms in her hair, and carried a shower bouquet of cream roses. The bridesmaids were Miss Erratt and Miss Alma Stumbles. They wore becoming blue-colored dresses. Miss Erratt carried a bouquet of pink roses and Miss Stumbles a basket of marguerites. —There has been a marked decrease in drunkenness in Boston during the past three years. In 1896 the number of arrests made for this offence was 28,840, which fell to 19,252 in 1897, and to 16,625 last year. This gratifying decline is attributed to the more prosperous times and industrial activity, and also to the probation system. This system, it appears, is working well. When a person is arrested for being drunk his case is carefully investigated, and if circumstances warrant it the prisoner is released and put on his good behaviour. The probation officer asserts that many reformations have been effected by this scheme. Why not try it in Charlottetown?
