

Well-run council meeting gets business underway

There were thirteen council members present at Thursday night's emergency Student Council meeting, just enough for a quorum. The first item on the agenda was the setting of a date for by-elections and it was decided that nominations should close Sept. 29 and elections be held Oct. 6.

Council readily approved Bill Chandler as acting comptroller, to be paid to be paid two weeks usual salary, and Susan Hornby as acting electoral officer.

Paul Currie, S.U. Vice President, proposed that the pinball machines, pool tables and jukebox that Ray Cooke wants to install in the Barn be put in for a one month trial period and this motion was

carried by council. The Executive will decide later on a method of paying someone to watch them.

The Student Directory being published by Communications Officer Elisabeth Burke was given the go-ahead with the stipulation that those who didn't wish to be listed be given the opportunity to take their name off the list.

The problem of many S.U. members not being allowed to attend Pig & Whistles because they are under 18 was brought up, and after much discussion, Mike Clow moved that one Pig within the next two weeks be available to minors and that a count be taken to see if they really take advantage of it.

Council also approved the

selling of 300 pictures of CUP membership fees of Main Building with the profits \$832.00 were approved and to go toward financial student Fallfest dates were set for aid. Just how the money will be allotted was not decided. Oct. 13, 14, 15 & 16. Date for the next council meeting was not set.

Photo dilemma solved with council approval

Over the summer the Student Union Executive commissioned Ian Judson, a student at U.P.E.I., to take pictures of Main Building.

They then bought 300 of these pictures at \$2.70 each thus overspending their bud-

get without council's permission. It wasn't until Thursday night's council meeting that the pictures were officially adopted by council. They are to be sold for \$5.00 and the profit from the sale of these pictures was to be used to set up a Student Aid Fund administered by Student Union.

A similiar fund is presently being run by Student Services and it is expected that it will continue to be available to students.

Jim Griffith has told Derek Key that if the S.U. wishes to go ahead with this project a \$650.00 grant will be given as a beginning incentive and a \$500.00 annual grant will be donated.

Council could not decide if this plan was indeed feasible so they postponed a decision on how to use the profits until a later date. It's possible they will never have to worry about that decision as there has to a profit first.

CIMN prepared for license hearing

UPEI's radio station CIMN faces one problem in its application for renewal of its broadcast license, that of technical certification by the Canadian Radio-Television Commission and the Federal Department of Communication.

The station will seek a license renewal at a Halifax hearing of the C.R.T.C on October 5. The C.R.T.C. and the Department of Communication are demanding the installation of a field, strength meter in order to approve the station's technical certification. Since the station expects to have such a meter installed by mid-January there is little likelihood of the C.R.T.C not granting the station a license renewal.

On-campus radio is relatively new and the C.R.T.C's rules concerning broadcasting have not been updated to meet

the problems faced by these new stations. CIMN has faces some problems with the C.R.T.C over music and programme content since it received a broadcast license in 1973. The C.R.T.C. is now trying

to form policies about college radio stations and so it is expected that they will try to pressure CIMN into airing more educational programming and Canadian music during the next few years.
