**Miscellaneous News.**

The three Benois, prisoners in the Ridout murder case, were placed in St. John's, Newfoundland, jail.  
The steamer "John Bramhall," from New Haven, with war munitions, arrived at Constantinople, 27th ult.  
The father of a tall Howard family, living somewhere in Kentucky, is six feet four inches in height; the mother is six feet one inch; the sixteen sons range from six feet three to six feet eleven, and the ten daughters average six feet two.  
In the United States Circuit Court, on the 26th ult., in Portland, Postmistress Sarah A. Gerow, of North Hermon, was fined for peeping into a letter and gossiping about it.  
The Russian national debt, it is estimated, will be, on January 1, 1878, \$7,818,000,000 Holland guilders (about \$35,000,000), 210,311,510 (about \$500,000,000), 569,923,000 francs (about \$113,585,600), and 1,493,849,954 roubles (about \$955,995,964).

John Perry, of Hydeville, Vt., who on Wednesday agreed to leave his wife for \$200, returned at night, burned the house and shot himself through the heart.  
Conductor Ridgeway, of Baltimore, is under \$1,000 bonds for trial for not allowing a negro woman the same privileges on his train on the Ohio road as other passengers.  
An important case was decided in the Windham County Court at Bellows Falls, Vt., yesterday, Snow vs. Carpenter, to recover damages of a liquor seller for injuries received by a wife from a drunken husband. The case was tried a year ago and a verdict of \$1,800 for the plaintiff obtained. It went to the Supreme Court on exceptions, a new trial was granted and a verdict obtained this week for \$2,000 and costs. This is under the new Vermont law making a rum-seller responsible for the effects of his sales.

"OLD JACK BARRY."—The following anecdote is related of Old Jack Barry, the color bearer of the Ninth Massachusetts Regiment, who carried the regimental colors through Boston at the recent dedication of the Soldier's Monument. At the battle of Mavern Hill, towards the close of the day, the Ninth was exposed to a withering fire from the enemy. They had been ordered to hold their position at all hazards, but so murderous had become the fire which was fast thinning their ranks, that the men, weary from incessant marching and fighting, at last began to show signs of wavering. At a most critical juncture "Old Jack," as he was familiarly called, sprang from the ranks, and, advancing some twenty yards in front of the regiment on the double-quick, stuck his color staff into the ground, and turning to his wavering comrades exclaimed: "There, blast yer souls, come up to that!" The rebels took in the situation at a glance, and a regiment of Hill's command started out on the charge to capture the flag. The boys of the Ninth saw the movement, and with one of their wild cheers sprang forward to rescue the colors. The line stopped not when it came up to "Old Jack," but with headlong impetuosity dashed on to the line of advancing rebels. The two forces met; there was a short and confused struggle, and the advancing rebels retired in haste, and in disorder, with thinned ranks to their lines, without the coveted prize.—Boston Herald.

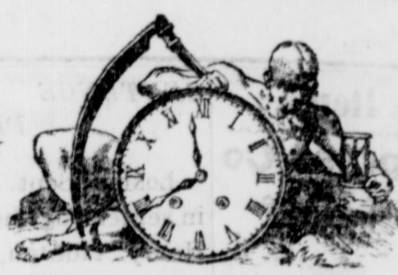
