

No Place For Hospital Which Turns Down The Poor Patient

QUEBEC (CP)—Two prominent Quebec physicians said Tuesday that a poor man has no place in modern society, he said.

COSTS BEYOND MEANS

Dr. Marcel Lapointe, medical director of Hotel Dieu St. Vailier of Chicoutimi, said modern medicine and hospital work has reached a stage where it is far

beyond the means of the average wage earner. He saw a possible solution in health insurance plans worked in co-operation with state authorities.

Dr. Desjardins said a survey of misunderstandings most common between hospitals and the public show they stem from "essentially

insignificant, easily corrected situations" created by "administrative assistants who are ill-trained, full of good will, but allergic to public relations."

Dr. Desjardins said hospitals have to integrate themselves in modern community life.

to co-operate with civic authorities and decline emergency cases are "no longer houses of God."

"To refuse in a general hospital first aid treatment to an injured child, under the pretext that there are hospitals for children, is unworthy of a Christian hospital."

Hospitals should guard against laxity in answering emergency

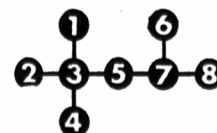

Reportedly Being Groomed For Federal Defence Post

OTTAWA (CP) — Brig. Jean Victor Allard, DSO and two bars, 43, of Nicolet, Que., may take his first step this fall toward an eventual cabinet post as defence minister.

Army headquarters announced today that Brig. Allard, now commander of the 3rd Infantry Brigade at Camp Valcartier, Que., will be appointed commander of the eastern Quebec area in late September.

Army sources said last summer they believed Brig. Allard was being groomed for the post of defence minister, possibly after the next federal general election.

Sources predicted that the first step in Brig. Allard's build-up to cabinet material would be appointment to command the eastern Quebec area. This first step, if it is that, now has been confirmed.

WON 3 DSOs

Brig. Allard, a barrel-chested giant of a man, won his first Distinguished Service Order at the Battle of the Arielli River, near Ortona, Italy, in December, 1943, while in temporary command of the Royal 22nd Regiment.

In January, 1944, he won the DSO again while commanding the Royal 22nd in the breakthrough of the Gothic line in Italy. He won his third DSO in March, 1945, leading the 6th Infantry Brigade in the breakthrough to Groningen in The Netherlands.

Since the war, he has served as military attaché in Moscow, vice quartermaster-general of the army and commander of the 25th Infantry Brigade in Korea. He has led the 3rd Brigade since September, 1954.
