Fighting In French Algeria

ALGIERS (AP)—Guerrilla warfare mounted sharply in French Algeria Wednesday. A climate of fear was increased by nationalist threats to "breathe" the element officials who fail to quit their government jobs. Scattered reports, unofficial and incomplete indicated 9 persons had been killed in the last 24 hours.

In Paris, Premier Edgar Faure and "admiral" ministers met to consider military measures in Algeria where Governor-General Jacques Soussu has asked for reinforcements. There now are at least 320,000 French soldiers in North Africa, mostly in Algeria.

An excellent group discussion was conducted, the subject discussed was a rural community. The delegates were divided into small groups each group had a secretary and chairman. After a twenty minute study period each group gave a report on their findings. Mrs. Manning reviewed each report and congratulated them on their good work. Mrs. Leslie Ramsay, convener of Arts and Literature spoke on the Institute Programs that are being planned for 1956 and gave many good pointers to those who are planning entering into the program contest this year and also gave some suggestions for the program of the month.

CARDIFF, Wales (Reuters)—Flags decked the city hall here Wednesday as Cardiff was officially pronounced capital of Wales.

Mayor Frank Chapman came from his sick bed to the steps of the city hall to hear the town clerk read his official announcement, which followed the statement in the House of Commons by Home Secretary Gwilym Lloyd-George.

Many Still Affected By Seasonal Unemployment

The Local National Employment Office has been a very busy spot for the past two days. Scores of people, seasonally unemployed, filed claims on Monday and again yesterday. Many of the claimants come from the country districts and drive a considerable distance in order to file their claims correctly and thus avoid needless delay.

Although there has been a rush of claimants in recent days, the office has 100 fewer claims than it did at the same time one year ago. As of the commencement of the week, 1005 people were drawing benefits against 1145 at the same date in 1954. Officials of the Local Office believe, however, that the figures will mount rapidly between now and the early days of the New Year, and early in January will be well over the 2000 mark.

At the present time the total of 1005 is made up of 410 claimants residing in Charlottetown and the Royalties and 585 others who live in the rural districts. After the Christmas holidays, many Charlottetown establishments will lay off workers, and there will be further small layoffs in the country districts also.

COMMUNITY EFFORT
In all cities of any size, the campaign is becoming an annual community organized effort, and it is being emphasized that any success achieved will be of far-reaching benefit. The Federal Government in particular, is taking every step to encourage the various campaigns although it is felt that each city or town can do much to help its own cause.

The Federal Public Works Department is timing the commencement of its building projects to start in the early autumn so that by winter the jobs will be far enough advanced to afford protection from the weather and at the same time provide employment when most needed.

The campaign however stresses the large amount of renovation work which can be carried out in the winter months, and all of it under warm and pleasant working conditions.
