Religion and Life

It is an inspiring sight—a free people going to the polls to choose the men who will govern them.

Through these men they decide the issues placed before them.

The people are free to think through those issues, free to express their questionings and conclusions, free to criticize their rulers and to replace them, and ready to submit to the authority of those who are chosen by the majority.

The campaign may be hot and the differences serious, but the moment that the votes are counted, the victors are accepted as the heads of the nation.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier visited British Columbia in the long ago, the Conservative Premier of that Province issued a statement to that effect: "It is not the leader of the Liberal Party who is visiting our Province but the Prime Minister of the Dominion, and everything that this Government can do for him is at his disposal during his stay among us."

It is this readiness to bow to the will of the people as a whole which makes our political system a success.

These rights and privileges of a free people did not simply happen; they are the result of the struggle of the centuries. This conflict has its heroes and martyrs—men and women who valued liberty more than life and put all they had and all they were into the realization of their ideals.

Inch by inch the heritage they have bequeathed to us was wrested from the tyrants of their time. And they add to their gift this warning: Rights unused atrophy, and rights misused are forfeited.

The loss of their liberties by many nations of our time is a frightful confirmation of the truth of their warning. Yet the danger before us is that so many of our people take their privileges for granted. They have never known any other system, and they are too accustomed to their liberties to appreciate them.

The number of citizens who will not even vote is a reproach to our civilization.

The first truth to be kept in mind is this: The ruler, by whatever method appointed, is commissioned to establish the law and do the will of God. We elect representatives, not delegates. We choose men to do the right as they see it, and to do it with all their might. It is important to know the principles and policies for which they stand.
