

Hillcrest Committee To Present Tax Brief

SUMMERSIDE — A meeting called by the Hillcrest civic committee was attended last evening by approximately 100, both service and civilian, and presided over by the chairman, E. Flewelling.

Discussion centered around three main topics with tax arrears and the town's tax structure being the principal concern.

Regarding back taxes the chairman stated no cars owned by service personnel are still impounded and in most cases where taxes were owed by servicemen, a satisfactory arrangement has been made between the individual and the town. Insofar as the tax structure is concerned, Mr. Flewelling told the meeting it is the intention of the committee to present a brief on this item to the council in the near future. It is understood, he said, that the major point of contention is the levying of direct taxes on non-property owners.

In addition to taxes many problems of a special nature which affect Hillcrest residents were brought up for discussion. Some of these were answered by the committee and others were noted with the understanding they will be discussed at a future committee meeting which Hon. Hubert MacNeil, M.D., provincial health minister has offered to attend.

Island Hospitals Seeking \$600,000 From Rebates

The Hospital Association of Prince Edward Island will promote a campaign to have the \$600,000 rebate of insurance premiums, which is about to be made by the Hospital Services Commission, assigned to the association, which will distribute the fund to each hospital in the province on the basis of the number of patient days' care each provided in 1962.

Announcement of the drive was contained in a brief submitted to the cabinet yesterday. It was submitted by association president, Dr. W. E. Dunlop, Summerside, and a delegation from the association.

The association intends to promote a drive to contact each subscriber who is qualified for a rebate on prepaid insurance premiums, and will ask the subscriber to assign his rebate to the association.

Seven recommendations were contained in the 15-page brief. The association recommended that the Hospital Services Commission be directed to make it possible, from government control. And, to this end, no ministers, deputies or other officials be appointed to the commission or any administrative position thereunder, and full control be vested in the commission.

Called for was the granting of fiscal autonomy for the commission in the Hospital Services Plan.

ADADEQUATE FUNDS
The association asked that the Hospital Services Commission be given adequate funds to retire all existing obligations and deficits of hospitals, since inauguration of the plan in 1959.

The association recommended that the "legal and moral" responsibility of the plan be placed on the boards of trustees to control their respective hospitals be fully recognized, and that they be made available to them to the extent of at least 25 per cent of the difference between preferred accommodations, to be used at their discretion to ease the restrictions imposed by the insurance plan's budgetary control system.

Two Youths Receive Deferred Sentences

SUMMERSIDE — Deferred sentences were meted out to two youths by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County morning when they appeared on separate charges.

James McKernan, 27, was given a deferred sentence until June 27 when he pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering the dwelling house of Wesley Reeves, South Fredericton, Jan. 25.

Crown prosecutor, George R. Crowe, stated that McKernan was with some juveniles and they entered the house and took a number of small articles, but these had since been returned.

McKernan stated they felt the matter was "happened in the bag before it got out of hand in the community." The magistrate told McKernan his sentence in June will depend upon his behaviour until that date.

A deferred sentence until June 27 was also given James Francis Hamill, Middleton, when he pleaded guilty to a charge of damaging a cottage by lighting a fire in it. The property of Leonce Arsenault of Summerside. Accused elected trial by magistrate.

Accused stated he and some juvenile companions ran into the cottage to get shelter from the cold. He lit a fire in the stove, and when he went to bed he heard of the fire there the next day.

RCMP stated the youths entered the cottage in a non-peaceful manner and the flames ignited the ceiling. The fire destroyed the roof of the building.

In deferring sentence, Magistrate MacDonald issued a warning that accused would in effect be passing his own sentence by his behaviour until June 27.

Leo Charles Provost, Richmond Hill, was given a deferred sentence until June 27 for driving while his license was suspended.

Accused charged of driving without due care and attention on the highway near Derwin Bell Heustis of Carleton Place, was dismissed on the grounds of insufficient evidence. Accused had earlier pleaded not guilty and evidence was not called.
