THE PORK DUTY. (The Empire). That Canadian lumbermen's employees now, thanks to the tariff, live on whole-some Canadian beef, instead of upon Chicago mess pork as formerly, does not appeal to the Globe as something to be grateful for. It looks upon the pork tariff as an effort to help the producers of pork at the expense of the lumbermen, which is lamentable. A friendly feeling for the Americans would prompt the organ to throw down the tariff, hand over the country to the Chicago pork packers and let the native pork packing industry go to smithereens or somewhere. And yet the chief opposition organ is reaching out a friendly hand to the farmers, who raise hogs and know that the tariff in this respect has benefited them. They might prefer to see Chicago pork coming in free to feed the people, but we doubt it. If the lumbermen themselves were consulted, we think they would decide in favor of fresh Canadian beef, rather than go back to foreign fat pork, even though to them it may go under the seductive name of "spring chicken." But the duty does not gratify pork raisers in securing the home market for their superior product, but the cattle raisers will approve of it when they find that it creates a demand for stock in the lumbering camps. There are upwards of 4,000 men at work in the woods on the upper Ottawa. We ask the Globe if it is not better, regarded from the standpoint of the general good, that these men should be fed on the products of Canadian farms, than that their principal food-supply should come from a foreign country, to the advantage of the foreign producer. The lumbermen prefer fresh beef to mess pork, the limit-owners find it cheaper to provide beef, and the stock-raisers, the railways, the drovers and steamboat owners benefit by the trade which has been created and kept money in circulation. Speaking on this subject, the Chatham Plant pronounces the following sensible opinion: "Not only does duty retained the home market to the Canadian hog breeder and packer, stimulated the industry and kept quotations to the farmers at a profitable level, but it has given the consumer a far better quality of hog products and has not enhanced to him the price thereof. The Planter has it on the word of a local dealer and packer, whose sympathies are not with the Conservative Party nor his trade notions imbibed from N. P. doctrine, that the pork duties are of decided advantage both to producer and consumer in this country, and their removal would be fraught with danger to one of the most important industries in the country."
