WORKING FOR 100 DONORS AT LONG CREEK CLINIC - Mrs. Allison MacMillan of Fairview, and Mrs. W. R. Shaw of St. Catherine's, have been successful in securing canvassers to enlist donors and transportation for them where necessary for the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic to be held at Long Creek Hall for the first time on Thursday, December 2. This Clinic is being held at Long Creek to make it more easier for donors from 16 districts in this vicinity to attend as otherwise they would have to come to Charlottetown. It least 100 donors will be required at this Clinic and in order to accomplish this at least eight donors are needed from each of the 16 districts concerned. It has been pointed out that every person in good health and between the ages of 18-65 years should assume the personal responsibility of being a donor and in this way play his or her part in meeting the increased demand for donors because of the need for more blood to be used for the manufacture of gamma globulin to be used in fighting polio and the additional amounts being requested daily for use of patients in our own hospitals.

Planning Better Meals

Continued from page 2 chases. Price by no means indicates food value. *Keep up with the current food situation. Listen to the radio and watch the newspaper for food information and market reports. *Buy food which are most plentiful. *Buy fruits and vegetables in season when most reasonably priced. *Check over all foods on hand before buying additional supplies. Do not buy more food than you can store properly. *Make sure you are getting good value and weight what you buy. *Buy by weight or quality... never ask for "so many cents worth". *Remember that cheaper cuts of meat are as nutritious as steaks and chops. Be sure you get bones and trimmings you pay for. Beef and pork liver are as good for you as calves' liver. *Compare prices and quality of bulk and packaged foods. The former are usually cheaper but often require more care in storing. *Buy by grade when possible and buy the quality best suited

to your needs. *Read the labels on canned and packaged foods. The label tells you "what" and "how much" you are buying. *Prepare and cook food carefully using recipes and measuring all ingredients accurately with standard measuring cups and spoons. Make good use of left-overs.
