DR. WALL'S WILL.

We learn that Dr. Wall left a will by which he appointed the Rev. J. J. McDonald, P. P. of Kinkora, William Deighan, Sr., and George R. McMahon, Station Master, Emerald, executors, and gave \$1,000 towards a new church at Kinkora, and \$500 to the new Cathedral, Charlottetown. To the clergy of the Cathedral, Charlottetown, \$300 for masses for the repose of testator's soul, and \$100 to Rev. John T. Brantly, of Bonaville, also for masses. \$150 to each of the following priests for the same purpose, viz., Rev. Dr. Doyle, Mr. Gillis, Rev. J. J. McDonald and the Rev. Dr. Chaisson. To Dr. Sutherland and Dr. McNeill, \$75 each, and a fur coat to Dr. Sutherland. \$150 to Parish Priest, Kinkora, for masses for his own and his father's and mother's souls. To testator's brother and sisters \$300 each, and \$2.00 to be invested and interest paid to his sister Elizabeth for her life, and after her death the \$2,000 to go to the convents in P. E. I. To each of his executors \$50 besides their legal expenses. To his housekeeper \$100. He appoints J. E. Wyatt, Craig, Solicitor of the Estate, and gives \$13 to Bernard Crokin, and \$500 for new church at Indian River, and \$150 to Marshal McMahon to be put in bank until he is 21 years of age. The rest of the estate, real and personal, goes to St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown. The will is dated 2nd Nov., 1896, the day before the Doctor went to the hospital, and is witnessed by P. J. Trainor and George R. McMahon.

DELAIED BY THE ROADS.—The Halifax Mail says: The schooner Alaska arrived last night from Alberton, P. E. I., laden with a cargo of 5,570 bushels of oats for George A. Tyke, Captain Smith, of the Alaska, says the roads on the island are in a fearful state, and it is almost impossible to get any hauling. He was obliged to lay twenty-one days waiting cargo on account of the state of the roads and continued bad weather.

SHIPPING DISASTERS.—The schooner L. H. Davies, from Halifax for Alberton with a general cargo, is reported stranded near Alberton. The vessel and cargo are insured. The schooner Soulan, from Grand Narrows for Newfoundland, went ashore at the entrance of Big Bras d'Or during the late gale, and was abandoned. Sixty cords of lumber were on board, and the vessel floundered. The damage is slight.

NEW GLASGOW CHEESE FACTORY.—The Directors of the New Glasgow Dairy Company have closed their factory for the season, after doing a fine summer's work both in the quantity of cheese manufactured and the price realized. The make was considerably larger than last year, despite all the drawbacks of the first of the season. There will be a meeting of the shareholders and patrons on Wednesday, the 25th inst., at 1.30 p. m., when the present patrons will receive the balance due them for this year, and to arrange for enlarging the factory for next year. All parties who purport sending milk to the factory next year are requested to attend.
