Points Dangers From Missiles

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A fleet of winged missiles could cruise over the earth for months on end, ready to streak down on any target at a moment's notice, the space-age conference was told Friday.

General manager William F. Balhaus of Nortronics, the electronics division of Northrop Aircraft Incorporated, said:

"Considerable research now is in progress on atomic engines. Such engines will make it possible for winged missiles to cruise for months over the face of the earth."

"Should present negotiations with the Russians for an open skies agreement ever materialize, I can visualize a fleet of winged missiles with atomic engines and automatic reconnaissance equipment maintaining a constant aerial inspection which is part of the open skies plan."

"If we were to let our imaginations rove, we could see fleets of atomic-powered winged missiles carrying thermonuclear warheads cruising endlessly in a condition of immediate readiness to strike at pre-selected or command targets."

Such missiles, Balhaus said, would not need refuelling and would have to be returned to their bases only for periodic maintenance work.

He said the missiles would be guided from the ground.

Quebec East Is Scene Of Pitched Political Battle

QUEBEC (CP)—Quebec East, Liberal fortress for more than 75 years and political home of Quebec's Liberal greats, is the scene of a pitched political battle that has the provincial capital figuratively sitting on the edge of its chair.

The sprawling, white-collar worker district that has been represented by former prime minister St. Laurent, the late Ernest Lapointe and Sir Wilfrid Laurier has seldom seen anything to match the fight that is being waged on behalf of the Progressive Conservative and Liberal candidates.

At grips are Yvon Tasse, Progressive Conservative candidate, backed to the hilt by Premier Duplessis' Union Nationale party, and Maurice Lamontagne, young economist who was one of Mr. St. Laurent's advisers until the downfall of the Liberal government in last year's federal election.

SEEK PERSONAL DEFEAT
The contest has become more than a straight federal election fight.

In the books of any political party Quebec East would be a top prize and worthy of special efforts but what is adding the 1958 political fight added zest is the fact the Union Nationale is, quite openly, bent on the personal defeat of Mr. Lamontagne.

In previous elections Progressive Conservatives gave token opposition to the mighty Liberal figures in Quebec East. Rallies were thinly attended. Meetings were about as exciting as parish card parties.

But all the excitement of typical Quebec campaigns with its train of door-to-door workers, flamboyant oratory and nightly meetings has descended on Quebec East.

Transport Minister Antoine Rivard, a top man in Mr. Duplessis' cabinet, has been pulled out of St. Lawrence south shore ridings where he was campaigning earlier to set the pace of the Union Nationale party's onslaught on Mr. Lamontagne.

He is seconded by Emilien Rochette and Armand Maltais, two members of the Union Nationale party representing Quebec seats in the provincial legislature and both citizens with considerable prestige in the city. Fisheries Minister Camille Poulot made an appearance on the hustings Sunday.

All have said over and over again they are not linked with any federal party. They say Mr. Lamontagne must be defeated because he is the author of a book opposed to provincial autonomy, because he stands against provincial rights.

The book—Le Federalisme Canadien—dealt with federal-provincial taxation problems and supported the federal-provincial taxation agreements which Mr. Duplessis rejected as encroachments on the province's constitutional powers. The book said the Quebec government's stand was wrong.

Broadside delivered against Mr. Lamontagne now has extended to his former Laval University professor, Very Rev. Georges-Henri Levesque, onetime dean of the faculty of social sciences at Laval and now superior of a nearby Dominican retreat house.

CHALLENGES UN CLAIMS
Father Levesque was a member of the Massey commission on arts, letters and science which recommended federal grants to universities, a measure which Mr. Duplessis has described as an invasion of a provincial domain.

Mr. Tasse, a professional engineer and former chairman of the Greater Quebec Trade and Industrial Development Bureau, has limited his speeches to federal issues. As an engineer, he has said, he can help make suggestions to reduce unemployment.

Mr. Lamontagne, campaigning with a small organization has challenged Union Nationale efforts to represent him as being opposed to provincial rights.

TIMELY NOTES ON FUR TOPICS

One of the finest collections of mink garments ever assembled for a fashion tour is being readied for showing in Europe. The Montreal-designed collection of 26 garments will be exhibited by the Canadian government's department of Trade and Commerce in five European cities through mid-May.

The collection was designed by Seymour A. J. Alexander Furs Ltd., Montreal, in association with Canada mink breeders. A group of 17 garments in such Canadian wild furs as beaver, muskrat, marten, otter, squirrel, ermine and fox will be exhibited along with the mink group mentioned above.

The first presentation will be in Paris in a salon display, with girl models at the France-Canadian building on March 24 and

running until March 29. The show is aimed at stimulating European interest in top-quality Canadian mink and wild furs. It will move on to Vienna, from April 8 to 11; Frankfurt from April 24 to 29; Grindelwald, Switzerland May 2 to 5; the tour will wind up at Milan, Italy, from May 12 to 17.

OPERA CAPE
The mink collection was previewed in Montreal before press and trade government men. Five full-length coats, including one opera cape—coat in Lutetia, were greatly admired, as were the other fur and mink garments. Twelve gowns worn with the furs, and going with the collection to Europe, are original designs from leading Montreal couturiers. The government department will also show 20 sets of costume jewelry from Henry Birks and Sons Ltd., Montreal.

Meyer Suchat, father of Seymour, the designer, representing A. J. Alexander's, will fly to Europe to accompany the collection on its tour, leaving Montreal, on March 19. Government representative on the trip is William M. Ritchie, chief of the fur section, marketing service, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Police in Utica, New York, are investigating the theft of an estimated \$20,000 worth of furs, which were removed on March 10 from the premises of Morris Wolochin Furriers in that city. Burglars bored their way through the ceiling of the fur store, and cut a hole large enough for a man to slip through, avoiding the burglar alarm. Then the thieves dropped some eleven feet to the floor. They also took an estimated \$200 in cash.

INTO MINK
From Brothers, Inc., that was a mighty name in fox farming some twelve years ago, and who had to discontinue that line of fur farming like hundreds of others here, are now just as big a factor in mink farming as they were in fox farming. They are offering 40,000 pelts with various types of mutations and standard mink at their showroom at Hamburg, Wisconsin, on Tuesday, March 25.

They are a wonderful family, and the history of their operations, which appeared in a book form some years ago, was well worth perusing.

A despatch from Buffalo, New York, to "Women's Wear Daily" states that despite the effort of fur retailers there to generate consumer interest in other fur types this season, mink continues to dominate the retail scene. Store report sales good in coats around the \$2,500 level, jackets at \$798, stoles from \$338 to \$498, and shoulder button capelets at \$275.

The following are approximate quantities that are being offered at the Dominion Fur Auction sales, Ltd., Winnipeg this week. 10,000 ranch mink (including mutations), 3,000 wild mink, 25,000 muskrats, 17,000 squirrels, 15,000 ermine, and lesser quantities of other furs.

Longer styles are being featured in silver and mutation fox to coordinate with new, ready-to-wear fashions. A number of these are in natural blue fox, but silver fox and white fox share with mutation fox in this styling.
