A HEAVY BLOW.—The St. John Sun says: The sch. Anita, Capt. McLeve arrived yesterday from Charlottetown, with a cargo of old rails. On Tuesday night, when about twelve miles S. S. E. of Cape Sable, the Anita encountered a heavy blow, during which she had her jibboom and outer jib carried away.

ANOTHER EXPEDITION.—An expedition which promises to be interesting is being planned by some young men in North Sydney. A small vessel is to be chartered and with a party of twelve leave for Hudson Bay on a prospecting trip in the spring. With \$700 they think they will be able to secure the necessary outfit, which means a little over \$20 apiece. None but stalwart and energetic youths will be taken, and they think with a little hardship they will be able to discover a Klondike at Labrador and Hudson Bay.

RAILWAY APPOINTMENTS.—It is announced from Moncton that Mr. E. H. Schaeffer has been appointed district freight agent of the I. C. R., his district covering the division east of Moncton, and including the Prince Edward Island Railway. The Times says that the appointment may involve the removal to Moncton of one or two people connected with the freight department of the Island railway. Mr. Schaeffer's many friends in Charlottetown will congratulate him upon the appointment.

COUNTY COURT AT SOURIS.

The County Court was in session at Souris for three days last week, Judge Reddin presiding. There was a full-sized docket. The more important cases were as follows:—

Currie vs. McIntosh.—Debt \$16.00. This case was tried last court and adjourned to this term. Judgment for plaintiff. Rattenbury for plaintiff; Whear for defendant.

McIntosh vs. Currie.—Trespass and trover for wrongful taking of hay and grain of plaintiff. This was a cross action brought against the defendant as an offset to the above case. The defendant had directed the sheriff to seize certain hay and wheat as the property of a nephew of plaintiff against whom he had a judgment. This had been done and the defendant had finally after the sheriff's sale acquired the hay and wheat. The plaintiff claimed that the hay and wheat were his property, and had been wrongfully seized. Judgment was reserved with proviso that the judgment in above case of Currie vs. McIntosh would not be final until judgment was given in this case. Whear for plaintiff; Rattenbury for defendant.

Rose A Simpson vs. Daniel F. Macdonald.—Trespass \$150.00. This was an action against the sheriff, for wrongful seizure of the plaintiff's goods, namely a horse and 250 stooks of oats. The horse had been returned after the sheriff's sale by the purchaser but the oats had been retained. This case was adjourned to the March term on the application of the defendant's counsel, Arthur Mellish for plaintiff; Mathieson for defendant.

Gallant vs. Mellett.—Action for damages \$75.00. The evidence given thus far is shortly as follows: The plaintiff states that at the end of October the defendant came to his house, a log cabin in a clearing in New Acadia, and while he was away took away his cooking stove, that he had no other stove in the house, and his wife being within a few days of confinement was made ill by the cold and action of the plaintiff, and that his child also took cold and he had to secure medical attendance.

The defendant, while admitting the taking, claimed to be justified in as much as he held a lien note for seven dollars that was three weeks overdue. On the application of the counsel for the defendant this case was also adjourned till March. Arthur Mellish for plaintiff; Mathieson for defendant.

Whelan vs. McLeod.—Debt, \$48.00. The plaintiff claims \$48.00 from the defendant being the price of a wagon sold by him to the defendant, R. C. McLeod, through his agent, Wm. H. Morrow (who absconded last fall). On a written affidavit of the inability of the defendant to be present the case was adjourned till March. Arthur Mellish for plaintiff; Neil McQuarrie for defendant.

Rocette & Dion vs. Morrow and Robb Engineering Company] vs. McDonald & McEachern.—The plaintiffs in above cases claimed that they should be allowed protest fees in addition to the amounts sued for, which point the Judge reserved for a previous court.

The Court now rules that in all cases of inland bills of exchange and promissory notes he will not allow protest fees, as protest is not compulsory and as he does not wish to increase the costs of the Court. A. Mellish and Whear for the plaintiffs.

At the conclusion of the Court, Judge Reddin stated that hereafter if counsel are unable to attend to their cases, he will not grant a plications for postponement on that ground.
