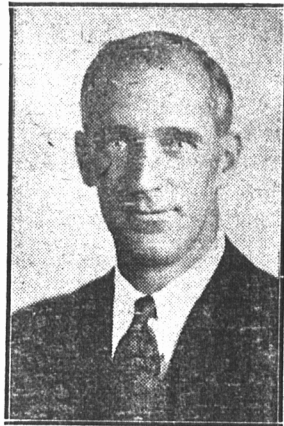


Provincial and Federal Officials



DR. J. A. CLARK

Organized the Experimental Station, Charlottetown, in 1909 and the Illustration Stations in Prince Edward Island in 1923. He has made these centers the farmers' headquarters for agricultural information and has assisted the Provincial Department of Agriculture in all their Agricultural Short Courses. He was loaned during the Great War and organized agricultural instruction for Educational Services in the Canadian Army where he had 18 college and 9,000 students in agricultural classes. Has served as President of the Charlottetown and Maritime Boards of Trade and Vice-Chairman of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. President of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. and Vice-President of the National Council Y. M. C. A. Elected to the Senate of Acadia University and Associated with the course in Public Administration in Dalhousie University. Past President Maritime Baptist Convention and of the Maritime Religious Education Council; a Trustee of the Prince Edward Island Hospital and was secretary of the building committee during its construction. A charter member and Past President of Rotary; also a member Canadian United Baptist Foreign Mission Board. Has published bulletins, pamphlet and reports on Agriculture; originated Charlottetown No. 80 barley and discovered the co-relation between the mean temperature of March and the yield of farm crops in Eastern Canada.



A. V. SAUNDERS

Inspector of Postal Service for Prince Edward Island, was born at Charlottetown. He was educated in West Kent School and Prince of Wales College and entered the Postal Service in the Charlottetown Post Office in 1912. During the war he served in England and France for three years with the Canadian Postal Corps. On return from overseas, was transferred to the Post Office Inspector's office and was placed in charge of the district in Sept. 1932. Mr. Saunders has been prominent in Golfing circles for the past fifteen years, being Past President of the Maritime Provinces' Golf Association and a past president of the Charlottetown Golf Club. Before the war he took an active part in athletics, being a member of the Abegweit Hockey, Baseball and Basketball teams.



DR. A. J. MURCHISON

Was born at Clyde River in 1897 and began his education at Clyde River School and Prince of Wales College. He enlisted with the 105th in 1916 for service in France and returned in the Spring of 1919. Entered Dalhousie University in 1922 and graduated in 1928. Dr. Murchison was a member of the Manhattan Hospital staff from 1928 to 1934. Since 1934 he has been a member of the staff of Falconwood Hospital. He is a member of the P. E. I. Medical Association, The Canadian Medical Association, The American Psychiatric Association, the Canadian Legion and The Gyro.



WARREN L. BRENTON

Provincial Dairy Superintendent, Charlottetown, P. E. I. A typical "Bluenose", a native of Brookfield, Colchester County, Nova Scotia, where for a number of years he was manager of the well-known Brookfield Creamery, Limited, then with the Dominion Department of Agriculture as Inspector of Dairy Products for the Maritimes with headquarters at Truro, Nova Scotia, coming to Prince Edward Island as Dairy Superintendent in 1929. An active Rotarian and ardent curler and obliging official really interested in the Dairy work.



MAJOR ERROL S. NOTT
V. S. B. V. Sc.
Dominion, Department of Agriculture

A native of the Maritime Province of Thomas Nott and K. G. Mrs. Nott, of Dalmeny, Nova Scotia; Graduate of the Nova Scotia College of Agriculture, the Ontario Veterinary College and University of Toronto; served France as V.C. of the 28th, Dr. R. F. A. in London. Dr. B. E. P. joined the staff of Health of Animals Branch in serving in various capacities in Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime. Made Senior Veterinary Inspector for the Province of P. E. I. Upon the re-organization of the Federal Department of Agriculture in 1928 was appointed Supervisor of the Health of Animals Division, the Live Stock and Poultry Division and the Province of Prince Edward Island.



CHARLES F. H. MACDONALD

Was born in North Sydney, Cape Breton. He received his education at the North Sydney Schools, Sydney Academy, St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, Nova Scotia, and the Nova Scotia Technical College, Halifax. Before coming to Prince Edward Island one year ago, as Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works and Highways. Mr. Macdonald had twelve years experience in this work with the same department in Nova Scotia, as well as one year each with the Imperial Oil Limited and the Alexander Murray Company Limited of Halifax. Mr. Macdonald enjoys golf and curling and is a member of both these Charlottetown clubs.



LOUIS B. MACMILLAN

Deputy Minister of Public Works and Highways, has spent almost 50 years in Government service, more than any deputy in any other Province, probably even in Federal service, having served under five sovereigns, eleven governors and fifteen premiers. Born in Summerside on October 17, 1873 he entered the Government service as a messenger at the age of 16 years and was promoted to his present position in 1900 at the age of 26. He has always taken an active interest in amateur sport, being a prominent member of the Abegweit Club and participated in hockey, football, tennis, track and field sports. Keenly interested in public welfare he organized the Province during the war for the Army Hut campaign, also for hospital and educational purposes. He is a strong advocate of temperance being a teetotaler and an anti-prohibitionist.



CAPTAIN C. R. PALMER

Born Roseville, P. E. Island. Enlisted in The Canadian Expeditionary Force. Served in Belgium, France and with The Army of Occupation Germany. Now with The Prince Edward Island Highlanders (Black Watch). After return to Canada entered the Department of Fisheries and now holds the position of Fisheries Technician.



W. R. SHAW

Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was born at St. Catherine's in this Province; is a graduate of the University of Toronto in the Science of Agriculture and, during his student days and in the many important positions he has subsequently filled he has had a brilliant record. Spent some time in the field of farm journalism and has had a wide experience in dealing with rural education, production and marketing problems. His ability as a writer, administrator, organizer and public speaker are well recognized in Eastern Canada. The demand for his services in his capacity as Deputy Minister and in the development of a large number of organizational activities in the Province attest to his popularity and ability as a public official; in addition to his public duties, owns and manages a farm, "Strathnairn", at West River Bridge on which his great grandfather settled as a pioneer.



G. E. RITCHIE

Inspector of Income Tax, born and educated in Charlottetown, joined the wholesale staff of Carter & Co., Ltd. in 1906 and transferred for wholesale stationery house for one year, returning to Charlottetown in 1907 and opening book and stationery store; was overseas as Lieutenant in the Canadian Sloop Factory in the invalided to Canada in May, 1918, was appointed Second in Command of Dispersal Station "A", in Charlottetown, July, 1918; appointed Chief Assessor Income Tax Division, Dept. of National Revenue, Sept., 1919, and promoted to Inspector of Income Tax December, 1920. Large increases in Income Tax revenue since appointed Inspector. Prominent in musical circles; for several years soloist in St. James Presbyterian Church Choir, and has performed in several light Operas. Recreational shooting and fishing.
