Fancy Flavored Eagnogs For A Beverage "Break"

IF IT'S just too hard to wake up in time, don't rush out without food, whatever your age. If hurry must be the keynote for the day, a really thinking homemaker will stop scolding and instead have waiting a drink-and-run breakfast consisting of an egg drink and toast, or with a muffin or big cookie to munch.

DRINK-AND-RUN BREAKFASTS For Youngsters

Orange Egnog Served with Buttered Toast or Coffee Cake

Orange Egnog: With an egg beater, beat 1 egg and 2 tsp. sugar until very frothy. Beat in 1/2 c. re-liquefied dry milk crystals and 1/2 c. orange juice. Makes 1 big, big cupful.

For Grownsups

Serve Orange Juice, Buttered Toast or an English Muffin and a Brimming Cupful of Hot Coffee Egnog

Hot Coffee Egnog: Using an egg beater, beat 1 egg in a big coffee cup until frothy. In a small saucepan, heat 1 c. re-liquefied dry milk crystals until scalded. Add 2 level tsp. instant coffee and stir into the egg. Sweeten to taste.

When neighbors drop in for a mid-morning chat, hot egnog tastes wonderful, and is comforting, refreshing, and at the same time both energizing and relaxing.

Today's special egnog (see below) is made with instant non-fat dry milk crystals, oranges and orange extract; it's low in calories and budget-wise, too. LITTLE LADY EGGNOG

3-c. re-liquefied instant non-fat dry milk crystals

(according to pkg. directions)

6 eggs

2 tsp. sugar

1/2 tsp. orange extract

1-1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/2 c. instant non-fat dry milk crystals (extra from pkg.)

1/2 c. ice water

2 tsp. lemon juice

Nutmeg (extra)

Combine the re-liquefied instant crystals, eggs, sugar, orange extract and nutmeg. Beat well; chill.

Just before serving, stir extra instant crystals from pkg. into ice water in bowl. Beat 3 to 4 min. or until soft peaks

Add lemon juice; beat 4 min. or until stiff peaks form. Fold into chilled milk mixture. Dust with a few grains extra nutmeg.

Serves 6.

Change Being Considered In Present IODE Name

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — The possibility of changing the name of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire because it is out of date was discussed today by IODE National President Mrs. D. W. McGibbon of Toronto.

Addressing the annual luncheon meeting of the London municipal chapter, Mrs. McGibbon said:

"I'm sure everyone who has heard someone say, 'What a name — don't you know the Empire has gone?' Add to that the word imperial and it is easy to see why the unlearned have a certain picture of the order in their minds."

"Certainly we realize the Empire has dissolved, but we were advised if at all possible to retain in any new name the letters IODE."

She said the name is established as associated with the educational and service work done by the 65-year-old organization.

"As for the word imperial, it could be changed to independent. But personally I wonder if all the businesses that have that word (imperial) in their name feel the need to change it. I doubt it."

In an interview Mrs. McGibbon said no overnight change of the name is being considered. Text of her speech was issued to the press before delivery.
