250 Students Attend Montague High School

Over 250 students are attending Montague Memorial High School this year, according to the report of the Principal, Mr. Arthur Malley. This number is slightly less than last year when a record number of over 260 were enrolled in all grades. The congestion of last year, however, is not present owing to the new room which was built this summer in the basement, and which permits the full attendance of grades one and two.

Several new teachers have been added to the staff, the new members being: Arthur Malley, principal, Angus MacLean, Irene Bruce, Shirley Jenkins, and Eileen MacKendie. Those of the former staff include: Harold F. Landry, Ruby MacLeod, Mrs. Minnie MacDonald and Mrs. Elsie Watterworth.

The large number of students has made it necessary for several teachers to have one full grade and part of another, which, although not ideal, presented the only possible solution. With the continued activity of the Home and School Association, and the cooperation of the citizens of the community, larger facilities may be provided in the future to take care of further increased enrollment for as Montague High School becomes more and more considered as a central school, a larger number of students from outside the district will enroll here, and only by such a long-range program will these needs be looked after.
