SCOTT ACT IN MONCTON.—Moncton has a surplus of \$6,100 Scott Act fines for the year 1897. The previous years net revenue from fines was \$1,500. The increase in 1898 was due to the fact that the inspector conducted prosecutions himself.

LEAGUE OF THE CROSS.—The League of the Cross social in the Lyceum last night was a great success. During the evening Father Johnston administered the total abstinence pledge to about 280 members. The members of the League attended in regalia.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—A special meeting of the City School Board was held last evening, at which the estimates for the current year were submitted. The principal items were discussed at some length, and they will be finally adopted at the next meeting of the Board to be held on the first Monday in February. The Board decided to pay the teachers two-thirds of the amount of the supplement withheld by the Provincial Government. This means that the Board will have to pay about \$500 more this year than last.

POLICE COURT.—There were seventeen cases disposed of at the police court during the month of January. There were 4 convictions for drunkenness, 3 for violating the Liquor Regulation Act, 2 for refusing to assist the police in the discharge of their duty, 3 for assault and 1 each for vagrancy, larceny and nuisance. One drunk was dismissed, also one summons charging a breach of the Liquor Regulation Act. There were in all 15 convictions against the same number for the corresponding month of last year.
