## PROGRESS OF SEWERAGE

Work Done up to the Present—Con-  
nections Being Made.

Work upon the outlet pipe at Pownal  
wharf is progressing favorably and Mr  
Thorpe expects to have 300 feet of iron pipe  
down before navigation closes.

The coffer-dam that the pipe is laid in  
is located on the western side of Pownal  
wharf, and is constructed of 3x12 matched  
plank driven some six or seven feet  
into the mud to ensure tightness. The  
top of the cofferdam is level  
with the water at high tide.  
It is about nine feet wide and 125 feet  
long. From its extreme end to a point  
about 200 feet past Pownal wharf and will  
out into the current, there will be 20-inch  
cast iron flexible-joint pipe.

The end of the coffer-dam nearest the  
wharf is already connected with the main  
sewer line. The pipe used in the coffer-  
dam and connected with the sewer is 20-  
inch cast iron.

The first coffer-dam was put down on  
the wharf while the two man-holes were  
being constructed and pipe connections  
made. When this work was completed the  
coffer-dam was removed. These coffer-  
dams are put down to keep out the tide-  
water during pipe-laying; and when  
this work is done the plank are taken up.  
It is expected that the second one will be  
removed about the middle of next week.

The line from King to Water Street, on  
Pownal Street, will be completed ab-  
out the middle of next week. This line connects  
with the pipe already laid, about two-and-  
a-half miles in all.

Pipe-laying has been completed from  
Pownal wharf along Pownal street to  
Fitzroy, along Fitzroy from Pownal to  
Prince, from Fitzroy to Water, along both  
sides of Queen, on the north side of Grafton  
from Queen to Hillsborough and on  
the south side from Prince to Hills-  
borough. Pipe-laying on Richmond street  
has been completed from Pownal to Great  
George street, and by the last of next week  
it is expected that the pipe on Richmond  
street, from Hillsborough to Weymouth,  
will be laid. The main pipe line has also  
been completed along King, Queen, Water,  
Prince, Sydney and Hillsborough streets  
to Grafton street.

People living on these streets may be-  
come connected with the sewerage system  
at any time. Already several connec-  
tions have been made.

The work of sewerage the other streets  
of the city will be continued next summer,  
and pushed forward with all possible des-  
patch.

All the work on Pownal wharf, includ-  
ing the outlet pipe, has been done by the  
Commissioners Lyday's labor. It is under-  
stood that the expenditure upon this part  
of the work this fall, will be between \$3000  
and \$4000.
