Coun. MacDonald for the Public Property Committee reported considerable damage done at Victoria Park by hurricane "Edna". He stated that 75 feet of concrete had to be replaced. Thirty feet of this has already been poured. Coun. MacDonald presented a plan of the proposed changes in the City Building and the Council discussed at the meeting to discuss this.

Coun. Gormley, chairman of the Police Committee, congratulated Chief MacArthur on being successful in getting the Police Chiefs' convention at Charlottetown during the coming year. He made reference to the motor cycle nuisance in the City, especially on Sunday nights, and suggested that if it could not be curtailed by ordinary means, the City should take under consideration the adoption of a bylaw which would make it unlawful to operate these machines after a certain hour.

Coun. Gormley brought to the attention of the Council the problem of directing school children when they are leaving the schools. He pointed out that there were not enough policemen to be present on these occasions and asked the co-operation of the school principals in appointing some of their older children to assist in this matter.

### POLICE OFFICER

A resolution calling for the appointment of Alan MacLeod to the Charlottetown City Police Force for a period of one year was moved by Coun. Gormley and seconded by Coun. Hutchison. The motion was carried unanimously.

Coun. Rogers, chairman of the Fire Committee, told of his visit with the Fire Marshall and the Fire Chief to the City schools during Fire Prevention Week. He stated that the discipline was excellent and that the evacuation was carried out in a prompt and orderly manner.

A resolution dealing with the removal of the City scales building was dealt with. Coun. Gaudet felt that it would be a mistake to do away with these scales entirely since some coal merchants who did not have weight scales would object to having their coal weighed on another coal merchant's scales. He also felt that the scales were providing a valuable public service with which they could not reasonably dispense.

On motion of Coun. Gaudet and seconded by Coun. Johnstone, it was decided to move the present building to Victoria Park and to erect new scales at the foot of Prince Street.

A resolution calling for a price of \$5 to \$15 be charged for the removal of trees from private property was moved by Coun. Johnstone and seconded by Coun. Gaudet. The question arose as the result of the numerous requests from citizens to have trees removed.

### Montague Council Approves Change In Terms of Curling Club Loan

Due to the absence of Mayor Bruce Yeo because of illness, Councillor Douglas MacGowan presided at the monthly meeting of the Montague Town Council held last night.

The Montague Curling Club applied to the council to have the terms of the agreement by which they will repay their loan, changed from \$750 for 15 years to \$1,000 for 10 years. In passing the application the council wished to make it quite clear to the Montague townspeople that the Curling Club are not borrowing money directly from the town's funds. The council explained, it is merely acting as an intermediary between the club and the Provincial Government, by borrowing \$10,000 from the Government and in turn loaning it to the Curling Club and holding for security the first mortgage on all

of the club's real estate and a chattel mortgage on the artificial ice plant for 10 years.

Permission was granted Mr. Donald MacKinnon to put a street through his property at his own expense provided the street met the specifications of the submitted plan and is not less than 60 feet wide.

It was learned by a letter to the council that an area of what property was offered them for sale but the matter was left in abeyance. On being informed that the old post office had been turned over to crown assets, the council left the matter of buying it or not buying it until tenders have been called for its sale.

The various committees reported that nothing unusual had happened during the past month and on motion the meeting was adjourned.

moved since the last hurricane. Coun. MacDonald brought up the question of purchasing a new boiler for the Market Building. He referred to two letters which had been received from Mr. Van Marlon of the Maritime Electric Co., who made a certain recommendation regarding the type and capacity that should be used. Coun. Hutchison objected to the installation of the proposed 50 h.p. boiler and felt that a 70 h.p. one was needed to carry the load.

His Worship suggested, since this matter had been under consideration for some time, that they bring it to a conclusion, one way or another. Coun. Gaudet then introduced a resolution calling for the acceptance of the tender of Douglas Bros. and Jones for the installation of a 50 h.p. boiler at a cost of \$5,250. Coun. Hutchison's amendment calling for the purchase of a 70 h.p. boiler was defeated. The main resolution carried.

UNION AT STAKE  
George Burt, UAW Canadian regional director, said the company is determined to break the union in this strike. He said the real issue now is the right of the union to speak for the men.

During the day, rain-drenched pickets slowly walked the lines in front of all 22 gates to Ford premises. There was no sign of violence as office workers, maintenance men, hospital workers and security guards were passed through union lines. All carried union passes.

The company powerhouse was kept in operation but supervisors from another section of the plant were blocked from entry. Company executive offices transferred operations to a downtown hotel.
