The money will go into a trust fund for the children, currently living in Toms River with Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Bach. Sponsors are seeking to raise \$75,000 for the fund.

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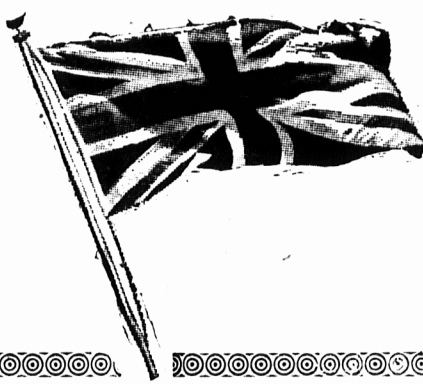
