Workingmen Making Trouble.

VIENNA, Nov. 9. A large body of workingmen paraded the chief streets of the city to-day. They made a hostile demonstration. The troops were called out and charged the mob with fixed bayonets. The workingmen stoned the troops, and during the riot the chief Magistrate and a Bailiff was fatally stabbed. Delegates have been appointed to inspect the prisoners.

England's Plans of Settlement.

LONDON, Nov. 9. Russia demands that the British Government shall submit their plans for the settlement of the Egyptian question to a Conference of the Powers.

Forty three Lives Lost.

LONDON, Nov. 9. Forty-three lives were lost by the explosion of Clay Cross Colliery.

Tel-el-Kiber and Quebec.—Irish Politics.—Britain's Power.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The Lord Mayor gave his annual banquet last night. The attendance was large and the speeches unusually eloquent. Sir H. E. C. Childers, Secretary of War, made a brilliant speech in which he drew a parallel comparing the storming of Tel-el-Kebir by General Sir Garnet Wolseley with the taking of Quebec by the brave General Wolfe. Mr. Gladstone in course of a grand oration on the Government policy, at home and abroad, gave particular attention to the Irish Question. He said a new sentiment was dawning in Ireland. It was the proper sentiment. The people are tired of factious and unlawful opposition to government measures and they are now manfully seeking the amelioration of harsh laws by peaceful and, what he believes will be, successful efforts. Referring to the Egyptian question he said he cherished the hope that Great Britain would be able to proudly prove her power side by side with sister nations, while she would always associate it with liberty.

Wolseley offers to Suppress Irish Disturbances.

DUBLIN, Nov. 10. The Freeman's Journal, in yesterday's issue, alleges that General Wolseley asked the British Government on his return from Egypt, to give him control of military affairs in Ireland, with a view of completely suppressing the disorders which have existed up to the present.

Arabi's Trial.

CAIRO, Nov. 10. The trial of Arabi Pasha has been postponed for three weeks.

Abolition of Egyptian Control.

CAIRO, Nov. 10. The Egyptian Government has presented a note to the Agents of Great Britain and France, demanding the abolition of the Joint Control.

European Control Abolished.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The Egyptian Ministry yesterday issued a note announcing the abolition of European control in Egypt and the appointment of a high Commissioner.

French Deficit of 150,000,000.

PARIS, Nov. 10. The French Chamber of Deputies re-assembled yesterday. The Journal Debates estimates the deficit in the revenue of France for the past financial year to be one hundred and fifty millions francs.

A Divorce Suit.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The Divorce Court, yesterday, granted a decree dissolving the marriage of Colonel Wellesley, formerly an attaché to the British Legation at St. Petersburg, for adultery with Kate Vaughan, the celebrated actress.

The O'Connor Don.

LONDON, Nov. 10. O'Connor Don, M. P., has received an offer from Mr. Gladstone, of the Under-Secretaryship of Ireland. It is believed he will not accept it.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. The delegation in the forty-eighth Congress will consist of nineteen Democrats and fifteen Republicans, a Democratic gain of six.

The citizens' ticket in the City of New York, is defeated by about 20,000 majority. The Democrats have undoubtedly secured a considerable majority in Congress. Our returns give them 174 members, against 150 Republicans. The amendment to the constitution providing for the abolition of tolls upon the canals of the State, and making them free for ever, has been carried by a handsome majority.

The Eagle says Brooklyn gives Cleveland 40,000 majority, and all the Democratic City and County candidates are elected except Carroll, (Dem.) for Registrar.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 8. The entire Democratic State ticket of Pennsylvania is elected.

BOSTON, Nov. 8. The election in Massachusetts yesterday, resulted in the success of General Butler by about 13,500 plurality. The remainder of the Republican State ticket has been elected. The Executive Council and Legislature are Republican. There were elections in thirty-two other States yesterday. In New Hampshire, Hale (Republican) possibly has a small majority for Governor. The Republicans elect two Congressmen and a majority of the Legislature. Rhode Island returns two Republican Congressmen. Connecticut elects Mr. Walter (Dem.)

crat) Governor, and the other three Congressmen elected are Democrats, a gain of two members for the Democrats. The Legislature is Republican.

In New Jersey George McRobeson (Republican) is defeated, and the Democrats carry the Legislature.

In Pennsylvania there is a reported plurality of \$30,000 for Patterson (Democrat) for Governor, and a loss of several Republican Congressmen.

WILMINGTON, Nov. 8. Delaware is said to give a Republican majority.

Virginia on a vote for Congressmen at large is claimed both by Readjusters and Democrats, with chances in favor of the former.

Returns from further Southern States are slight.

In North Carolina the Democrats claim 8 of the 9 Congressmen and the Legislature. In South Carolina the Democrats had their own way except in one district.

In Georgia the Democrats announce the election of a solid Democrat delegation to Congress, and the defeat of Felton and Spear, Ind-pendents.

Of Florida's vote no judgment can be formed.

On the returns received, Alabama also reports full Democratic Congressional delegation.

Mississippi probably elects Chalmers and Jeffereys, Independents, and possibly Lynch, Republican.

In Louisiana the Congressmen, with one exception, will be Democratic.

Texas of course expects large Democratic majorities.

Indiana is probably Democratic. In Illinois, E. R. Morrison, Democratic, is probably defeated.

In Wisconsin, there were Democratic gains in every congressional district, and a loss of Republican Congressmen is conceded.

Iowa Republicans lose one Congressman, but elect a State ticket by a heavy majority. General Bates, low tax Democrat, is probably chosen Governor of Tennessee.

Both parties claim California; and Nevada and Colorado, is in doubt.

VIENNA, Nov. 7. A serious riot occurred to-day in Reuban a suburb of this city. A large number of workmen, joined by a mob, stoned the police and attacked and destroyed the police station, wounding the commissary in charge. Troops were sent to the scene and restored order. Twelve workmen and several police were injured. Many rioters arrested.

LONDON, Nov. 8. The Daily Telegraph, in a leading article, says that Englishmen can hardly be expected to contemplate with equanimity the seeming probability that the next President of the United States will be a Democrat.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9. The British ship "Kingsport," which left here on Sept. 20th for Liverpool, returned last night, having been dismantled and otherwise injured in a gale on October 2nd.

LONDON, Nov. 7. It is believed that 30 persons were killed by the explosion in Clay Cross Colliery.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. Mrs. Langtry made her debut last evening at Wallack's Theatre before one of the largest and most fashionable audiences that ever assembled in a New York theatre.

The hon-ton of the city, a number of men of letters, artists and celebrated personages were present. She made a favorable impression, and her impersonation of "Hester Grazebrook," in "An Unequal Match," is conceded by the critics to be a fine performance. The debutants was repeatedly called before the curtain and was the recipient of any number of floral tributes. The applause upon her entree was deafening. The miserable scene left nothing to be desired.

CAIRO, Nov. 7. Sir Auckland Colvin reiterated his determination not to attend the sitting of the Council of Ministers. Cherif Pasha, therefore, has informed M. Bredif, the French comptroller, in reply to his letter of inquiry, that, in view of Sir Auckland's declaration, and as the European control cannot be carried on by Bredif, alone, he has refrained from inviting Bredif.

LONDON, Nov. 7. The Times' Durban despatch says: Natives from the Transvaal report that two engagements occurred between the Boers and Caffé Mpoeh. They state that Mpoeh sent a decoy party, who retreated after a skirmish with the Boers, drawing the latter on through a neck where the Caffés fell upon and defeated them with a loss of 300. Subsequently the Boers were again defeated in the open country.

LIMA, Nov. 7. An earthquake was felt here at three o'clock this morning.

DUBLIN, Nov. 7. Cornelius Shea convicted of being a moonlighter and of making threats against tenants who paid their rents, near Killarney, has been sentenced to seven years penal servitude.
