Large Increase In Wood Islands Ferry Traffic

An increase of 1594 automobiles and 5310 passengers carried on the Wood Islands-Caribou service in the period May 1st to September 30th this year compared to the same period in 1950, is noted in figures released by the Northumberland Ferries Limited yesterday. The number of trucks ferried in the same period shows a decrease of 96, the large part of this deficit being in September, when 83 fewer trucks were ferried than in the corresponding month in 1950.
