May Develop Sports Field At Summerside

It has been learned unofficially that the Town of Summerside is planning to develop the property purchased recently from the Brennan estate into a sports field and park. This is a large tract of land and is bordered by Summer, Beaver and Granville Streets and the street that runs south of the new Prince County Hospital, Beauty Avenue.

What plans are only in the discussion state, it is understood that it is planned to have a half mile cinder track and possibly a softball and baseball diamond. There will also likely be several asphalt surfaced tennis courts.

It is understood that the Department of Physical Fitness will co-operate in the project. The playing field will be on the lower part of the lot and the park will be on the section nearer to the hospital. Plans will likely be drawn up during the winter and work can commence in the spring.—S.

- 1. Serving spoon, boot hooks for pulling the Wellington boots, silver smelling salts and muff warmer.
- 2. Set of old horse pistols.
- 3. Collection of earthenware, glass, porcelain, pewter, shells, photographs, and Christmas cards in use more than fifty years ago.
- 4. A number of documents dating back to the early years of British rule in P. E. I. These were found among other papers in the attic of the Court House.
- 5. Several old diaries dating back to 1840.
- 6. Old Legislative Assembly records.
- 7. Several ledgers of 100 years ago listing items purchased daily and by whom. A general store record of great interest.
- 8. Map of Charlottetown of 1850, drawn by Surveyor-General Wright.
- 9. Census of Charlottetown and Royalty of 1848 giving names of residents and occupations. Census also available for 1861 and for 1871.
- 10. Very old records of marriages and births and other vital statistics dating from 1790. It is planned to have these microfilmed.
- 11. Many old shipping records.

Plan Children's Aid Campaign

An organization meeting for the campaign for funds for the newly organized Children's Aid Society was held in the Town Hall, Summerside, last evening with His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge presiding. There was a large crowd in attendance.

The meeting was addressed by Mr. Glyndor P. Allen, of the Department of National Health and Welfare, family allowances division, Halifax, and Mr. Alan Nicholson, regional director of family allowances, Charlottetown.

Mr. Allen, who is in the Province assisting to organize the Children's Aid Society on a Province-wide basis, outlined the aims and objects and described the structure of the society.

Mr. Nicholson pointed out the need for such an organization in this Province and described the progress that has been made to date. Both speakers complimented Mayor Wedge for the fine leadership he is giving in Summerside and congratulated the people of the Town for the co-operation they are showing.

There was a question and answer period during which much information was gained by those present. Mayor Wedge briefed the canvassers and distributed literature and receipt books.

The drive will be held from November 20th to 30th inclusive and there will be a house to house canvass.—S.

adjoin the lab and a large dumb waiter is provided to transfer test tubes, glasses and other utensils to a sterilization room where they are thoroughly disinfected.

Next to the main laboratory room is a biochemistry lab and a testing laboratory. Close to these is the refrigerator and blood bank where a double thermostatic control has been installed to keep blood at the right temperature and at the same time keep it against freezing.

Across from the refrigerator is a special section consisting of two rooms which can be used for prolonged investigations.

Next door is a library and study room for six lab students who will be training at the centre. This room also has space for holding medical periodicals and other literature. Adjoining it is a haematology room where blood testing will be carried out.

Near the centre of the second floor there is a main business office which is opposite the Fitzroy Street entrance. Dr. Harold Shaw, Provincial Pathologist and Chairman of the Health Planning Commission, has an office adjoining this.

To speed up service and insure efficiency, a histology or tissue laboratory is located next to Dr. Shaw's office and when mail comes, through the main office it will be catalogued and distributed. The lab where the tests will be made, it is then sent back for mailing.

Another room has been set aside for a Canadian Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service.

On the north side of the second floor is the vital statistics room where the general public will call for records. Off this is the office of the director, W. T. Crockett.

Basement Facilities

The basement of the new building houses equally important equipment.

In one section there is a sterilization room which is situated beneath the main laboratory. A dumb waiter sends all used glassware, test tubes and materials for disposal down to this room from the lab. Large sterilizers and washings in various waters complete the work of disinfecting utensils in this room. Distilled water is also made here and sent to various rural hospital laboratories.

A refrigerator for storing butter and for testing it and also a butter sampling room are located in a section of the basement. Close to these are the stores room, media making and preparation room, power room, furnace room and incinerator.

There is also an agriculture business office and next to it is the office of Dr. Bishop.

An autopsy room for agriculture is situated on the south side of the basement. Opposite this are three rooms set aside as the animal colony where experiments are performed with guinea pigs and rabbits.

Top Floor Offices

On the top floor of the health centre are the administrative offices of the Department of Health and Welfare. This is where Hon. A. W. Matheson, the Minister, and Lt. Col. P. S. Pieling, Deputy Minister, have their offices. Chief Welfare Officer Jack Trainor and the directors of the various sections including the directors of mothers allowances and old age pensions will be located on this floor when the move is completed. Most of the Department has already moved in.

At one end of the top floor is a large, modern board room which will be used for staff conferences and other meetings.

The floors in the hallways and general offices and linoleum floors in the administrative offices have been completed. The building is bright, roomy and well-lighted. There are 98 windows in the new centre which is a frame building with insular brick siding finish. Cement walls run from the ground up almost ten feet around the building. Fluorescent lighting is installed throughout the building.

The health centre building got underway exactly one year ago. The contractor is M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd.

Housed in the old Polytechnic part of the centre are the division of Dental Hygiene, Sanitary Engineering, the Health Planning Commission, office of the chief health officer and the division of Public Health Nursing.

Space is available in the old part or the Division of Mental Health, Cancer control and VD control.

Besides the Premier and Minister of Health and Welfare, the following Government members visited the centre yesterday after a meeting of the Executive Council held earlier in the day: Attorney General W. E. Darby, Hon. F. A. Large, Minister of Education and Hon. J. Wilfrid Arsenault, Provincial Secretary.
