Ontario Planning Record Road Building Program

TORONTO (CP)—Provincial Treasurer Porter Thursday announced construction and maintenance program in Ontario for this year. In his budget address to the Ontario legislature, Mr. Porter said direct spending by the province would amount to \$183,000,000 including \$50,000,000 in road subsidies to municipalities which he expected would spend approximately \$50,000,000. The total last year was \$200,000,000.

The budget also hit new highs on gross ordinary account—the day-by-day cost of running government departments. For the coming year, revenue was estimated at \$438,322,000 and expenditure at \$437,554,000. Mr. Porter said the current year's figures—based on 10 months actual and two months estimated—would be \$428,991,000 for revenue and \$428,242,000 for expenditure.

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other bodies. Profits from government sale of liquor led the revenue upsurge with \$48,000,000 compared to an estimate of \$38,000,000. The tax agreement with the Dominion government yielded \$2,245,000 more than expected. The tax agreement is expected to be the biggest single revenue source in the coming fiscal year, with an estimate of \$151,700,000. Education took the biggest spending bite from ordinary account in the coming year with a total of \$108,460,000, up \$8,000,000 from the present year. Universities got \$7,240,000 for capital outlay in the special grants of \$19,300,000 from the current year's accounts, an increase of \$1,600,000 over similar grants a year ago. Hospitals got \$5,500,000 at the rate of \$200 a bed.

Ice Patrol Is Begun Over Gulf

The first aerial ice patrol of the season was carried out yesterday by Captain Angus Brown, who is starting his eighth year of ice surveying. Approximately one thousand miles were covered during which the Navy icebreaker H.M.C.S. Labrador, which is presently on a research cruise of the Gulf, was sighted in the vicinity of Anticosti Island.

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Would Wash Hands Of Whole Affair

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States told Russia Thursday that Soviet balloons have flown over U.S. territory—that is, Alaska—just as U.S. balloons have flown over Soviet territory. An American note to the Kremlin asked in effect: so what are you complaining about? "It is illogical," said the note made public by the state department, "that the Soviet government should desire one rule for itself and another for the rest of the world."

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
