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Lennox Island Notes

The Indians are busily engaged in their principal occupation, basket making, having made over 3,000 since December 1st, 1952.

Since February 18th, the commencement of the Holy Season of Lent, the Indians have attended Mass every day in large numbers.

Lennox Island for the first time in its history is going to have a telephone communication with the mainland. This will be a great benefit to the people who live on Indian Island. The Island Telephone Company has erected poles from the Central Office at Tyne Valley to MacLean's Point. From this latter point a cable will be placed under the water to Lennox Island. This cable will be laid when the river is free of ice by means of floating it on oil drums to the required location and then dropping it into the water.

Several persons have had narrow escapes crossing to and from Lennox Island this winter due to the poor ice conditions. One Indian fell through into the deepest part of the water which is about sixty feet whilst carrying baskets to the mainland. Another Indian who was accompanying him rescued him. At present some cars and light trucks travel on the ice to and from Lennox Island. Nevertheless, there are parts of the ice which are not fit for walkers.
