MONDAY

With all the ceremony attendant on such a solemn occasion the remains of His Excellency the late Bishop Boyle were taken last night from his Residence to St. Dunstan's Basilica where he will lie in state until the funeral tomorrow morning.

Hundreds of people on foot or in cars were gathered for the procession and stood with bare heads as the casket was carried slowly past on its way to the church where the late Bishop had so dutifully served.

Altar boys of St. Dunstan's led the procession followed by the men's choir, members of the clergy and chief mourners. The pall bearers were Messrs. Alfred McKeareney, Wendell Mullins, Thomas Creighton, Nicholas Power, Maurice Martin and Urban Blanchard.

A member of the R.C.A.F. was still unconscious in Prince County Hospital late last night following an accident about one mile west of Summerside. It occurred about 10:30 p.m. when his late model Vanguard sedan proceeding toward Summerside left the highway and after clipping off a wooden walkway leading to a nearby home, came out of the ditch about 100 feet from point of entry, and landed upside down on the highway in a badly smashed condition.

The driver, believed to have been the only occupant of the car, was thrown from the vehicle and was found unconscious on the pavement.

The accident occurred on the main highway just west of the intersection of the Western Highway and Linkletter Road.

The accident was investigated by Cst. Hender of the Summerside Detachment of the R.C.M.P., who was assisted by Cst. Ray Studden, of the R.C.M.P. highway patrol.

OTTAWA (CP)—Transport Minister Chretien, indicated Wednesday the government will give favorable consideration to the extension of the runway at the Charlottetown, P.E.I., airport.

He said in the Commons that his department believes it would be in the interests of the airport to extend the runway.

Municipal authorities of Charlottetown had been informed by letter that it would be necessary for the city to expropriate land for the proposed runway and turn it over to the government by way of lease. The runway facilities would be provided by the government.
