TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Brazilian Affairs.

LONDON, Nov. 19.

A despatch from Rio Janeiro this morning states that Fonseca, president of the new ministry, has formally announced the departure of Dom Pedro for Lisbon. Fonseca also announces that he will continue to exercise supreme executive authority until the country shall have definitely decided upon a new government. Meanwhile the ordinary functions of the administration will continue as under the old regime. The despatch of yesterday had a reassuring effect on financial circles. The feeling prevails that the change in government will not injuriously affect Brazilian financial obligations.

LONDON, Nov. 19.

Sir James Ferguson, in speaking of the situation in Brazil, says that the foreign government responsible to British creditors for fifty million pounds has been broken up, that British trade with Brazil represented \$11,000,000 yearly, and that the country took \$20,000,000 worth of English manufactured cotton per annum.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.

A large deputation waited on the Minister of Justice to-day to ask for the commutation of the death sentence passed upon Harvey, the Guelph murderer. They say that Harvey is undoubtedly insane.

Burglars entered Christ Church Cathedral here last night and stole the communion plate. They also made an unsuccessful attempt to rob a safe in the Dominion Express Company's office.

A blacksmith named Calkins was shot and killed by a neighbor at Beebe Plains, Stanstead Co., to-day. Both men moved into Canada recently from Holland, N. J.

Severe Storm.

LONG BRANCH, Nov. 19.

A storm set in yesterday afternoon which developed into a furious easterly gale. Great damage was done to bluffs and bulkheads along the shore between Saabright and Elberton. More serious results are feared should the storm continue through the night.

Judicial Appointments.

QUEBEC, Nov. 19.

Judge Cassault, of Quebec, has been appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court in place of Sir Andrew Stuart, resigned, and Jean Blanchet, ex-provincial secretary, has been made a judge.

Returned to Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.

The Governor-General and suite returned to Ottawa to-day. They were welcomed by the members of the city council. Lord Stanley says he was presented with sixty-one addresses during his tour through the Northwest and British Columbia.

More Philanthropy.

LONDON, Nov. 19.

Sir Edward Guinness has given £200,000 for the erection of dwellings for the laboring poor of London, and £50,000 to be similarly used for the benefit of the poor of Dublin.

The Protectorate Assumed.

LONDON, Nov. 19.

The Gazette announces that Italy assumes protectorate over the coast of East Africa, from the northern limit of Kismayu to a point two and a half degrees north.

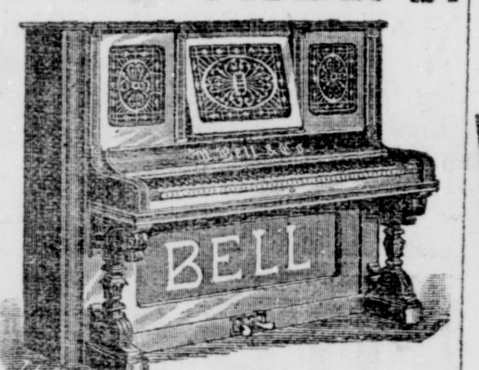
