Bandits Get \$5,000 In Montreal Hold-up

MONTREAL, Aug. 17 (CP)—Three armed bandits escaped with \$5,000 from a west-end branch of the Royal Bank of Canada after slugging manager William Hills on the head with a revolver butt.

The manager was taken to hospital where his condition was described as not serious. He told police that two men entered the Montreal and Harvard Street branch of the bank shortly after it opened this morning and ordered teller Jeannette Grise to "hand over." About seven customers were in the office at the time.

One of the bandits entered the manager's office and scuffled with Mr. Hill. Another teller, Tommasine Mansfield, unaware of the hold-up, entered the manager's office and told the bandit not to hurt Mr. Hill. She said later that she thought the man was a customer who had got into an argument with the bank manager.

The gunman then pointed a revolver at Miss Mansfield and she fled to the rear of the bank. While escaping through a washroom window she set off the burglar alarm and one of the men fired a shot at Miss Mansfield as she raced away from the building.

The bandits then scooped up the money from Miss Grise's cage and fled to a waiting stolen car where they joined a third man. Miss Grise told police that one of the men resembled a man that robbed the bank last September.

Religious Editor To Speak In Montague Church Of Christ

Burrus Butler, editor of the Christian Standard, religious weekly published in Cincinnati, Ohio, will preach nightly, except Saturday, in the Montague Church of Christ the week of August 21-27, according to announcement by Robert Bryan, minister of the Montague Church. The Christian Standard is a journal having an international circulation among members of Churches of Christ. Founded in 1896, it is published by the Standard Publishing Co.

Mr. Butler is an ordained Christian minister who served churches in Pennsylvania and Indiana before being called to his editorial duties in 1944. He will be remembered by many Island people as the guest preacher at the Prince Edward Island Christian convention in 1947. He will also speak at the Island convention in the Fredericton Church of Christ, August 18-20.

William Weale, of the Greenmount Church of Christ, a song leader and soloist, and talented musician, will have charge of music at the Montague meeting. The visiting preacher has announced the tentative schedule of his sermon topics, as follows: Monday, Aug. 21 — The Conquering Name of Jesus. Tuesday, Aug. 22 — Jesus Christ Is the Son of God. Wednesday, Aug. 23 — The New Covenant in the Blood of Christ. Thursday, Aug. 24 — The Church of the New Testament. Friday, Aug. 25 — The Promised Glory of the Church. Sunday, Aug. 27 — A. M. — Continuing in the Apostles Doctrine; P. M. — Secrets of Success in the Kingdom of God.
