Team Chosen For Toronto Trip

Miss Gloria Jenkins, Dunstaff, nage and Ian MacArthur, Union Road, members of the Millcove Holstein Calf Club won the right to represent the Province in the dairy project at National Club Week, Toronto. They were successful in winning over four other teams in judging four classes of dairy cattle and in an oral examination which took place at Charlottetown, Thursday, Oct. 7.

National Club Week is sponsored by the Canadian Council of 4-H Clubs and is held each year at Toronto at the time of the Royal Winter Fair. The above team will compete against the top teams from the other provinces in judging dairy cattle, four classes representing each of the main dairy breeds in Canada. Besides seeing the Royal, they will be privileged to see the inner workings of a large meat-canning plant, two farm-machinery factories, will see Niagara Falls, will visit the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa and will be presented to the Governor General, Vincent Massey. They will travel by Canadian National Railways as guests of the company. The accommodation, entertainment and the banquets are made possible financially by gifts from over twenty large Canadian companies.

Other young people representing the Province in other 4-H projects are as follows: Clothing, Jean MacGregor and Ruth Fay, East Baltic; poultry, Florence Larsen and Martin MacRae, Mount Buchanan; garden, Mary C. Lacey and Catherine Smith, Tracadie Cross. Miss Jenkins and Mr. MacArthur deserve the trip. They have been members of the Millcove club for several years and this is the third time they have competed in the finals. They had to be sharp to come out on top this year as the teams from the other clubs were worthy competitors. The clubs with those taking part were: Brookfield, Sterling MacRae and Jackie Barrett; Malpeque, Geo. Riley and Nelson Morrison; Head of Hillsboro, Wayne Cameron and Joyce Jardine; Sherbrooke, Byron Colwill, Jr. and Kathleen Dekker. These latter teams are for a three-day trip, too, as they will have a free trip to the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst.

PEI Paratrooper Has Narrow Escape

The life of an airborne engineer in Canada's parachute brigade is not an easy one, as Spr. W. S. Hughes of Charlottetown and scores of Calgary residents recently discovered. According to the Calgary Herald, forty members of No. 1 Airborne Troop, Royal Canadian Engineers, were making a routine parachute jump over Currie airport when Spr. Hughes' parachute failed to open and the young man fell 700 feet before he was able to get his emergency chute open and drift the few remaining feet to a safe landing.

In an interview following the incident, the plucky young sapper, veteran of 16 jumps, grinned, shrugged his shoulders and refused to admit that he had been in any danger.

He said he jumped from the plane when his turn came, counted off the three seconds as he was supposed to do and when his parachute didn't open he looked out behind him. The chute was streaming out behind him. He had plenty of time to think, he said, and all he could think of was the emergency parachute fastened to his chest. "Sure I was scared," he said, "but my past life didn't flash before my eyes." He never for a moment thought that "this was it. We're trained for emergencies like that."

Spr. Hughes, who has been a paratrooper for the past three years and has been with No. 1 Airborne Troop for the past year, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hughes, Euston Street.
