Snowstorms Strike East, Arctic Cold On Prairies

Heavy snowstorms swirled through Eastern Canada Monday while the West shivered in cold air flowing down from the Arctic. Snowfalls of three to five inches snarled traffic and clogged streets in southern Ontario. But the storms, moving eastward, were followed by dropping temperatures and clear skies.
Snow fell over most of Quebec, starting in the western part of the province, then spreading eastward. Falls of one to three inches were reported.
Clear skies prevailed in the Maritimes except in Cape Breton where there was some snow. The storm from Quebec was expected to move across the whole district early today.

NEWFOUNDLAND MUGGY

Snow, followed by rain and fog, hit southern Newfoundland Monday and spread inland with increasing winds.

As a result, he said, as too much money had to be borrowed from the banks, thus adding to inflationary pressures.




