NEW STEAMER.—We were shown to-day by Mr. John Hughes, a very handsome model of a new steamer, which will replace the "Heather Belle." Her dimensions are as follows: Length of keel, 120 feet; breadth of beam, 21 feet; depth of hold, 8 feet. Mr. Hughes informs us that he has entered into a contract with the well-known shipbuilder, James White, Esq., of Mount Stewart, to build the hull under the inspection of Lloyd's Surveyors. She will be coppered and copper lined. Her boilers, etc., are being built by the Messrs. Flemming, of St. John, and "The Nova Scotia Forge Co." of Pictou. She is expected to attain a speed of twelve miles per hour, and to be ready for her route in May coming.

PLEASE NOTE IT.—A sensible view of advertising is given in a recent issue of the New York Times. "A wholesale stationer in this city, who has become rich at his business, says his rule is, when he sells a bill for goods on credit, to immediately subscribe for the local paper of his debtor. So long as his customer advertised liberally and vigorously he rested, but as soon as he began to contract his advertising space he took it as evidence that there was trouble ahead, and invariably went for his debtor. Said he: 'The man who is too poor to make his business known is too poor to do business.'" The withdrawal of an advertisement is evidence of weakness that business men are not slow to act upon.

A YOUNG MAN named James Connolly, carpenter, was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning, charged with stealing the sum of fifty dollars from Mr. Patrick Sweeney, Messenger of the Provincial Building. Mr. Sweeney, on the 20th ult., was sent by the Secretary of Public Works—Mr. Morrison—to deposit the amount above named in the Union Bank. The bank was closed. He could not, therefore, make his deposit. On returning to the building, he left the money, enclosed in an envelope, in a box on the window leading to his apartments in the basement. Connolly was doing some carpenter work near the place. Sweeney returned to the window to get the money but book and all were gone. He spoke to Connolly about it. He said it must be on the window as he had seen it five minutes before. A general search was made in the building but the money could not be found. The evening following Connolly visited Sweeney's apartment. In the kitchen under the chair where he had been sitting, Mr. Sweeney's son Jeremiah picked up the deposit chest which accompanied the money. On the strength of this, Connolly was arrested. At court this morning evidence was taken, but it was not sufficient and the case was dismissed.

The New French Ministry.

PARIS, Feb. 26.
Chamber of Deputies has passed a vote of confidence in the New French Ministry, of which Jules Ferry is the Premier.
On the 22nd inst. M. Ferry explained the programme of the Ministry and solicited the confidence of the country. He said the Government's first care would be to satisfy the wish of the Chamber by applying the law of 1834, under which princes will be deprived of their military posts. The Government thought nothing more was necessary, for the present Republic is not endangered, and in the event of a conspiracy, would have ample power to protect itself by rights inherent in all Governments without infringing upon essential liberties of the people. The Government demanded that measures be taken against the utterance of seditious cries and against authors of seditious placards.

Steamer Foundered—All Hands Lost.

LONDON, Feb. 26.
The steamer "Bywell Castle," owned by Hall Bros., London, 892 tons, on passage from the Black Sea for Boston, foundered. All hands were lost. She was an iron screw steamer built at Newcastle in 1870.

Mr. Harrington, Secretary of the Irish National Land League, who was recently imprisoned for intimidation has been elected to represent Westmeath in the British Parliament.

The R. M. S. Sarmatian, arrived from Halifax last evening, having on board Messrs. Harris, Brown, Sterus and Paton, of Charlottetown.

Society Failure.

BOSTON, Feb. 26.
The Augustinian Society, in connection with the Catholic Church, at Lawrence, Mass., has failed. Its liabilities are estimated at a half million dollars.

Lost at Sea.

BOSTON, Feb. 26.
The steamer "Glen Morgan," while on passage from Liverpool to this port, lost Capt. Court and five other hands.

Telegraph Notes.

Lord Edgerton, of Tatton, is dead.
Ballantine & Raven, sugar refiners, Greenock, England, have failed. Liabilities, £80,000.
The Sheboygan Manufacturing Company's factory at Sheboygan, Mo., was burned on the 22nd; loss \$75,000.
At a general election held at Melbourne, Australia, on the 22nd, Sir Bryan O'Loughlin, Premier, and Mr. O'Sheanassy were defeated. The defeat of the ministry is certain.

Duncan C. Ross defeated Thiebaud Bauer in the second match for the Greco-Roman wrestling championship, which came off at Jacksonville, Florida, on the 22nd.

The first instalment, amounted to 1,000 marks, of money subscribed in Germany was sent to the United States on the 23rd in aid of the sufferers by the floods in Ohio valley.

Professor Chadbourne's, (President of the Amherst, Mass. Agricultural College) physician abandoned all hopes of his recovery, and stated that death was but a matter of a few hours.

The friends of a murderer, under arrest, at Tawas, Ill., made a raid on his guard, on the night of the 23rd, and in the fight which followed seven men are reported to have been killed and several more wounded.

A mutiny took place in the horse collar and harness shops of Jacob Strauss & Co., in the Jefferson City, Mo., Penitentiary, on the 23rd. Dave Taylor, a second term convict, set fire to the shop. The fire department rushed to the building, but as fast as the firemen laid the hose the convicts cut it, thus preventing the engines from doing any effective work for a time; but the guards finally overpowered the mutineers and locked them up in a blind cell. Meanwhile the fire spread to the shoe shop of Geisocke and that of the Standard Shoe Co., which were burned. The total loss will reach \$300,000.

SHIP NEWS.

Brig Fanny, Murchison master, at Buenos Ayres, Jan. 6th, from Liverpool, passage 53 days.
Passed Fortress Monroe Feb. 20—barque Sylvan, McNeal, from Carthagenia for Baltimore.

The Steamer Montreal, Bouchett, arrived at Halifax on Friday last. Reports very heavy weather on the passage. Feb. 1st, a terrific gale sprung up from N.W., accompanied by tremendous high seas, which lasted for four days, the water at times making a clean breach over the ship, damaging two boats, carrying away two ventilators, and everything on the deck. Feb. 19—on the banks, observed a small schooner rigged steamer in the ice heading E. 20, lat 44 57, lon. 47 59 W, passed several ice bergs and a large quantity of field ice off the Cape Breton coast.

The British barque Brothers, from Dublin, January 25th for Yarmouth, N. S., has put into Hol head, having lost bulwarks and sails and sustained other damage by collision.

The British brig Adrienne, from New York, Jan. 21st, for Ayre, was abandoned on the 15th inst. The captain and crew landed on the Isle of Wight.

The steamer Netley Abbey, at London from Boston had her decks swept, her boats smashed and sustained other damage on the passage.

Steamer Sernia, at New York, from Liverpool, reports Feb. 13 and 14 experienced hurricane, vessel shipping heavy seas in all directions, smashing four boats, badly damaging the bridge, knocking forward the smoke-stack nearly flat, and sweeping the decks fore and aft.

Twenty-two persons were drowned on the 22nd by the wreck of a steamer in the Bosphorus.
