KILLED ON THE RAIL.—A brakeman on the Cape Tormentine branch, named Corey Hoar, met with a terrible fate while shunting cars at Cape Tormentine on Friday morning. He became entangled in some way in a rope which he was using to shunt some cars, the result being that he was thrown to the track, the cars passing over his breast. He lived about an hour afterwards.

THE NEW LAW.—Under the new liquor law every bar-room in the city must be closed on Saturday evenings at six o'clock. It is said that every bar-room was closed promptly on time on Saturday evening last—the first Saturday under the new law. The main provisions of this law have already been outlined in THE EXAMINER. The penalty for an infraction of the law is the imposition of a fine not exceeding \$100 or 3 months imprisonment.

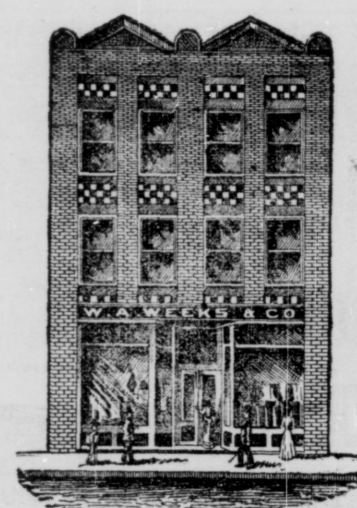
