MASSACRE OF CHRISTIANS

Mr. Goodnow, the American consul at Shanghai, estimates that between forty and fifty thousand native Christians have been murdered for refusing to recant.

Speculation continues in regard to the possible outcome of the peace negotiations. It is certain now that the Chinese will refuse to accept any plan that will include personal indignity to the Dowager Empress. The viceroys of the central and southern provinces, who protected the foreigners under the agreement with the consuls of the various Governments, will oppose any such plan, and will fight if necessary. They have two reasons for doing this.

In the first place, most of them were appointed to their positions by the Dowager Empress, or through her influence. Secondly, if any indignity were offered to the Dowager Empress, who is the official mother of the Emperor, the latter would lose caste with the people. This could never be recovered, and would result in the virtual extinction of the dynasty. The progressive Chinese are not averse to the proposition that the Dowager Empress shall be shorn of her power and influence, but they go no further. They will, however approve any punishment that may be meted out to Prince Tuan and the rest of the Imperial clan who are responsible for China's present troubles.

The Chinese negotiators would like to charge that the missionaries are responsible for the trouble, and may demand their withdrawal from the country, although they realize that such a thing is preposterous. In several official interviews before he left here Li-Hung-Chang declared that the responsibility for the trouble rested with the missionaries. The correspondent of the Mail and Empire asked a high official if Earl Li really believed this. He replied, "That depends on whom Li-Hung-Chang was talking to. If he was talking officially, yes." The Chinese approve of foreign physicians and educators coming to the country, but they hate the missionaries.

DESERVES ANOTHER SUBSIDY.

Here is a citation from the Toronto Globe:

The Conservative party founded the Dominion with the help of certain patriotic Liberals, whose services must never be forgotten. The opponents of that great work were the party of Laurier, Joly, Fielding. Sir Henry Joly spoke against it in Parliament; Fielding fought against it, and later on prosecuted a campaign having for its purpose the secession of Nova Scotia

and the destruction of the Dominion.

When it had accomplished the union of the Conservative party brought in the North-west Territories, and after that British Columbia. These progressive measures found opposition only in the Liberal ranks; and one gentleman opposed the addition of British Columbia on the ground that it was merely "a sea of mountains."

Then followed the National Policy, which was antagonized, and the construction of the Canadian Pacific which the members of the present Government bitterly opposed.

The Conservative party, besides extending our borders, build the Intercolonial railway, deepened our canals, provided transportation facilities reaching every town, and built the Sault canal; equipped our country with all the great works of public utility it now has.

Nor did it overlook other matters; it commenced the settlement of the North-West, and gave us a great population there; it opened up the splendid gold mining regions, it established experimental farms, dairy stations, and cold storage.

Since it has been out of office no thing has been added to what it did except the Drummond road, which is useless, and the Crow's Nest line, in connection with which there was a steal.

And the country is told now that: "The Conservative party in power stood solidly in the path of progress, and stunted the growth of the Dominion."

The organ is not expected to land the work of the Conservative party, for it cannot get "five more years of a full pocket" from that quarter. But it ought at least to be decent.
