Island Workmen Receive Awards

Two Island workmen received Vocational Institute yesterday safety awards at the Provincial Daniel Macdonald, an employee of Williams Murphy and MacLeod, Summerside was presented with a Turtle Club award. The safety cap he was wearing protected him from serious head injuries on September 15, 1965, when a concrete block weighing approximately 37 pounds, dropped eight feet from a section of wall at a construction job and struck Mr. Macdonald on the top of his head.

A Gold Cap award was presented to Joseph Stephen Macdonald who was wearing his hard hat when struck by a piece of angle iron eight feet long from 20 feet above him at the job site of the Regional High School. While he suffered lacerations of the skull, the workman would have received fatal injuries had he not been wearing a safety helmet.

Herbert Handrahan, superintendent of Williams, Murphy and MacLeod, general contractors presented the awards.

Number Of Tourists Continues To Soar

The number of tourists visiting the Island shows an amazing 22 per cent jump over last year and every available facility is taxed to almost capacity.

Visitors have packed resort motels and hotels, trailer parks and camping grounds to such an extent that secondary housing is being called into play to take care of the unexpected heavy overflow. Beaches are crowded daily.

The especially heavy flow of traffic on highways and city streets has kept all police forces busy to prevent long tangles and hasten the movement of tourist and resident alike.
