IN MEMORIAM

ALEXANDER J. ROSS

The death occurred at Flat River on Sunday, August 11th, 1957, of Alexander J. Ross in his eighty-third year. He was born on August 28th, 1874, and was the last member of a family of eight of the late John Ewen Ross and his wife, formerly Elizabeth Macdonald of Little Sands.

From his youth, the late Mr. Ross followed the building trade. He enjoyed the wide circle of friends and acquaintances, many of whom will remember him as a foreman with the Public Works Department.

Left to mourn the passing of a devoted husband and father are his widow, formerly Charlotte Ross, three sons, John Alexander and Martin of Flat River, Frank L. of Charlottetown and one daughter, Mary Grace of Flat River. Six grandchildren will cherish the memory of a kind and loving grandfather.

The funeral service was held from his late residence on Tuesday afternoon, his pastor, Rev. Donald Nicholson of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Belfast, spoke words of comfort and hope to those assembled to pay their last respect. The hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd" and "The Sweet Bye and Bye", a favourite of the deceased. A solo "Face To Face" was rendered by Mr. Cameron MacPherson.

The interment took place in Belfast Cemetery.

Copper Prices In U. S. Take It On The Chin

NEW YORK (AP)—Copper prices took it on the chin again last week while U.S. lead and zinc producers' hopes for tariff aid were just about counted out. Custom smelters of copper, who had held their price steady for more than a month, knocked it down 1/2 cent a pound on successive days, leaving the quotation at 27 1/2 cents a pound at the week's end. This put the smelters midway between the major producers' continued price of 28 1/2 cents a pound and the London Metal Exchange price, which late in the week dipped under 26 cents a pound. The smelters price now is less than half of the 55 1/2-cent peak registered in the spring of 1956 when copper was in short supply. The London price, more than 28 1/2 cents early in the week, sagged after the British government announced it would dispose of an additional 27,000 tons of copper from its stockpile. The reason for slow copper sales was shown in July statistics for brass mills wire mills and foundries. New business booked for the use of 69,359 tons of copper, off 23,734 tons from June and the worst showing for any month since August, 1949. Demand for lead at 14 cents a pound and zinc at 40 cents a pound slowed down as prospects dimmed for U.S. congressional help on import tariffs. True, the Senate finance committee shifted its flat three-cent tariff proposal to the administration's sliding-scale idea. But Democrats on the House of Representatives and means committee made it pretty plain the bill would die in committee. Tin prices slipped slowly but steadily for some weeks, received a new thrust last week from reported Russian sales of 1,000 tons to western countries. Major metals prices: Copper—27.25-28.50 cents a pound, delivered. Foreign 25.75-26.25 cents, nominal New York. Lead—14 cents a pound, New York; 13.8 cents, St. Louis. Zinc—10 cents a pound, East St. Louis; 10.5 cents, New York. Aluminum—28.1 cents a pound, in lots, shipping point (freight allowed); pigs 26 cents. Nickel—74 cents a pound, electrolytic cathodes, Port Colborne Ont., U.S. duty included. Tin—94.12 cents a pound, New York.

N. Y. Stocks Were Easier For Week

NEW YORK (AP)—Stock market prices were trimmed by an estimated \$5,700,000,000 last week as a mood of uncertainty over near-term prospects became tinged with fair doses of pessimism. It was the steepest drop since the week ended June 22. However, the total value of all stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange is around \$215,000,000,000. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dropped \$4.60 to \$173.60. The year's low was \$168.00 last Feb. 12th. The market last Monday took its worst setback since Feb. 11. Worry over the leftist coup in Syria, casting new doubt over affairs in the troubled Middle East with its rich oil resources, was a major factor. A renewed weakness in copper prices adversely affected the non-ferrous metals group. Canadian issues were mostly lower on the New York exchange. But Dome Mines was up 1/4 at 13 1/4. Losers included Aluminum Ltd., off 3/4 at 38 1/4; Hudson Bay, down 1/4 to 53 1/4 and Distillers-Seagrams, off 1/4 at 27 1/4. A Canadian issue, Scurry-Rainbow Oil, unchanged at 3 5/16, was among the five most active issues on the American exchange. Fargo Oils was a Canadian gainer, with a rise of 1 15-16 to 9 9-16. Richwell rose 1/4 to 1 1/2. Losers included Brazilian traction, down to 8 1/4; and Molybdenite, off 1/16 to 1 1/4.

LONDON (AP)

Thirty tons of wheat collapsed into a London sewer Friday, swelled up to four times its normal size as it hit the water and blocked part of the drainage system. The wheat had been pumped into a grain washing machine at a bakery. The drain cover on the machine gave way dropping the load into the sewers.
