

Miners Lead All The Way For 4-2 Victory Over Islanders At New Glasgow

NEW GLASGOW, (CP) — Glace Bay Miners led all the way in defeating Charlottetown Islanders 4-2 in the Maritime Major Hockey League Tuesday night.

Glace Bay moved to within five points of second place Sydney and are now five points ahead of Charlottetown.

The game, scheduled for Charlottetown, was played here by mutual agreement.

Bill Needham, Bobby Brown, Gordon Myles and Cooper Leyte scored for Glace Bay; Bucko Trainor and Buck Whitlock for Islanders.

Miners led 2-0 at the end of the first and matched Charlottetown goals in the second and third periods.

Roger Bessette in Islanders' net handled 29 shots. Cliff Hicks made 26 stops.

Needham took a pass from Kevin Rochford for the first goal and minutes later Brown scored on a play with Leyte.

Charlottetown opened the second with Whitlock passing to Trainor. Glace Bay matched it in the closing minutes of the period when Myles scored.

Whitlock scored again early in the third. In an effort to tie the game Charlottetown pulled out Bessette. With two seconds re-

maining Leyte shot the puck into the empty Charlottetown net.

Penalty Aids Sydney To 4-3 Victory Over Halifax

SYDNEY, (CP) — A third period penalty helped Sydney Millionaires to a 4-3 win over Halifax Atlantics in the Maritime Major Hockey League Tuesday night.

Halifax forward Pete Wywrot drew a minor penalty at 1:39 of the third and Roger Dubuc scored the winner for Sydney less than two minutes later.

Second place Sydney is now only seven points behind league-leading Atlantics.

Besides Dubuc, Roger Guay, Lorne Pirie and Gordie Gowan scored for Sydney. Bill Ford got two for Halifax and Bob Bowness added the third.

The loss was the second in successive nights for Atlantics.

Near the close of the first period Sydney broke a 2-2 tie when Dubuc passed to Andy McCallum who flipped the puck ahead to Cowan for a clean shot at McMeekin.

Each team had six shots in the second period, but Halifax scored the only goal when Bob Bowness set Bill Ford up at 2:37.

After taking the lead on Dubuc's goal in the third, Sydney played defensive hockey, holding Atlantics at bay the rest of the game.

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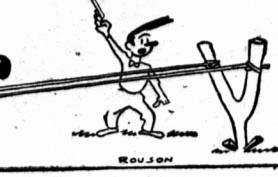
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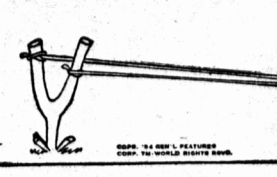

The Summerside Athletic Association's program for minor hockey, and skating for tiny tots have stolen the headlines from all other sports in this vicinity during the past week. It is the biggest program of its kind ever attempted in the Prince County capital, and seems to have the co-operation of the citizens. The size of the project is giving Jimmie Hogan and Bob Clark, the leaders in the movement, a few headaches, but both these men, and their assistants consider the beneficial results which should follow more than make up for the trouble it takes to keep the program functioning smoothly.

The tiny tots skating jamboree every Saturday morning is a tremendous thing. Somewhere in the vicinity of 400 boys and girls under nine years of age attended the first one. The spectacle resembled a huge flock of sea-gulls getting ready to become airborne. There was barely elbow room between the laboring but enthusiastic kiddies, and pride was very much in evidence both before and after a fall.

It is a fine gesture on the part of the management of the Raceway Stadium to provide this free skate for the youngsters, some of whom may be young-stars some day. It is also sound business. With the continuation of this program Summerside will have in future years a very large array of skaters to beat a silver tattoo at the box office.

Considering this, we should get much larger crowds in the comfortable, up-to-date Raceway Stadium.

Gordon Bennett was elected President and Layton Schurman of Summerside vice president. The secretary is Bill Ledwell.

Representatives of four teams were present at the meeting and signified their intentions of entering a team. The four are Summerside Aces, Charlottetown Abbies, St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College.

A fifth team, Preetown Royal, may also enter the League. Free town representatives were unable to attend the meeting but informed president Gordon Bennett last night that they wished to join the circuit.

Games will be played at the Summerside Raceway and likely the Charlottetown Forum. Most of the Charlottetown games will be Tuesday and Thursday nights while the Summerside games will be on Saturday.

The League schedule will open on Tuesday night, January 26 with Prince of Wales College playing the Aces in Summerside and St. Dunstan's playing the Abbies in Charlottetown.

Visiting teams will receive eight cents a head as their share of the gate receipts. The management of the Summerside Raceway will split the gate on a 50-50 basis with the teams.

According to plans at yesterday's meeting each team would play 12 league games. The first and fourth place teams and the second and third will meet in two game semi-final series while the finals will be a two out of three affair.
